Chairman von Gremp called the regular session meeting of the Board of Trustees of the University of Arkansas to order at 10:04 a.m. on Wednesday, January 21, 2015, in Little Rock, Arkansas, and gave the floor to President Donald R. Bobbitt for a special presentation.

#### Gift Announcement of \$500,000 from Tyson to eVersity:

Dr. Donald R. Bobbitt acknowledged a contribution by Mr. John Tyson and the Tyson Family Foundation toward eVersity and all that it means for the State of Arkansas. He sincerely thanked Mr. Tyson and his family and his associate Archie Schaffer, and further acknowledged former Governor Beebe and Trustee Morril Harriman for their efforts in providing matching funds. eVersity is predicated on the premise that Arkansans deserve the opportunity to advance their standing, and help their families and their communities economically through higher education. Mr. Tyson stated that eVersity is a complement to the great System of the University of Arkansas and he and his family are glad to be a part of it.

WHEREAS, Jeff served in the Office of the Arkansas Attorney General for many years, last as the Deputy of the Civil Department and in 1994 he took a position with the General Counsel's Office of the University of Arkansas where he was chief of litigation; and

WHEREAS, Jeff had an outstanding academic career, graduating Phi Beta Kappa in 1973 from the University of Arkansas, Fayetteville, where he received numerous awards among them the J. William Fulbright Award as the history student with the highest academic achievement; and

WHEREAS, Jeff achieved his Juris Doctorate degree from the University of Arkansas, Fayetteville, School of Law in 1977 where he graduated with honors and was a member of the Law Review; and

WHEREAS, Jeff was a member of the General Counsel's staff for over 20 years where he was a valued colleague of lawyers and staff in the office and where he won the respect and admiration of all with whom he dealt in the University for his unyielding advocacy, his principled and ethical manner and his good judgment and sound legal advice; and

WHEREAS, Jeff carried these values to his family, service to the legal profession, and community activities and was particularly involved in the Boy Scouts for many years and was supportive of the educational activities of his children; and

WHEREAS, Jeff brought distinction and honor to the University of Arkansas and to his profession;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF THE UNIVERSITY OF ARKANSAS THAT the Board expresses its sincere appreciation for the contributions and service of Jeffrey A. Bell to the University of Arkansas, his community and his profession, and expresses its condolences to his wife, Patricia V. Bell, his sons, John and Michael Bell, his daughters Emily Bell and Amanda Price and his extended family. # 4. Report on Joint Hospital Committee Meeting Held January 21, 2015:

Joint Hospital Committee Chair Goodson reported on the meeting held January 21, 2015, which included the approval of the minutes of the previous meeting held November 13, 2014. Upon motion by Trustee Goodson and second by Trustee Gibson, the following committee items were reported on and actions were approved by the full Board:

# 4.1 Approval of Safety Management Report, UAMS:

Dr. Roxanne Townsend presented the Safety Management Report for the period July through September 2014. Trustee Gibson noted the high number of product recalls reported to Central Sterile Supply at 411 however, only 41 applied to UAMS.

4.2 Review of the Performance Improvement and Patient Safety Report, UAMS:

Dr. Chris Cargile presented the Performance Improvement and Patient Safety Report for the third quarter of 2014. The Joint Commission arrived on December 15, 2014 for the unannounced full accreditation survey. The final report yielded three direct findings and four indirect findings. In response, interdisciplinary work groups have begun to implement improvements necessary to bring UAMS Medical Center into full compliance.

4.3 Review of Institutional Compliance Report, UAMS:

Mr. Bob Bishop reviewed the UAMS Medical Center Institutional Compliance Report for July – December 2014.

4.4 Review of UAMS Medical Center and Faculty Group Practice Key Operations Indicators and Accounts Receivable, UAMS:

Dr. Townsend presented the UAMS Medical Center Board Scorecard. Of note, volumes remain strong through the first half of FY'15. There continues to be variation in the Quality reporting measures with numerous different projects underway working toward sustainable improvement. Days in accounts receivable continue to improve since the EPIC Go Live.

Mr. Dan Riley reviewed UAMS Medical Center's and Faculty Group Practice key workload indicators for the period ending November 2014.

BOARD POLICY 305.1

## BANK DEPOSITORIES AND FISCAL CONTROLS

Any banks holding University funds on deposit shall furnish collateral for any deposits exceeding the maximum FDIC Insurance amount and applicable campus policies shall insure compliance with this requirement.

The President or Vice President for Finance or Vice President for Administration of the University of Arkansas is authorized:

- To open the necessary bank accounts, signify the appropriate signatures and, where required, to sign such other agreements as required by the depository in connection with opening an account.
- (2) To open the necessary accounts with investment or brokerage firms for the receipt, custody, transfer, or sale of securities owned by the University of Arkansas or the Board of Trustees of the University of Arkansas. A list of individuals and their titles, any two of which are jointly authorized to assign, sell, or otherwise dispose of any and all registered United States securities or securities for which the Treasury Department acts as transfer agency and any and all securities, including stocks and bonds, will be provided to the Vice President for Finance by the Chancellors and Directors and updated when authorized individuals change, or, at a minimum, on an annual basis.
- (3) To approve campus policies and procedures for the use of facsimile signatures for checks, the use of manual signatures for checks exceeding a certain amount, and policies regarding wire transfers to or from accounts of a bank, brokerage firm, the Commonfund, and other financial institutions by designated officials at the campus level. This authority shall be exercised only following the President's or Chief Fiscal Officer's review of, and satisfaction with, campus policies, procedures and controls regarding disbursement of funds and fiscal controls.

6.4 Discussion Concerning Facility Renewal and Stewardship Plan Second Phase, UAF:

Early in FY08, at the request of Chancellor Gearhart, President Sugg and the Board of Trustees approved the implementation of a student fee of one percent per year for five years. This fee—coupled with additional internal financial commitments within the operating budget, development efforts, grants, private gifts, and other miscellaneous sources of dedicated funds—was used to finance Phase I critical maintenance issues on the campus. The initial increment took effect in FY09, with additional increments each year until the 2008-stated target amount was reached in FY13. As a result, from FY09–FY13, the university was able to invest \$251 million in facility renewal and stewardship.

Chancellor Gearhart presented Phase II of the plan, which calls for adding an additional one percent increment per fiscal year for five years—FY 2016-2021. Such a fee will enable the campus to maintain and update its facilities, meet the classroom and laboratory needs of the burgeoning student body, and help to ensure the university's national/international reputation as a very high research designated institution. Chancellor Gearhart plans to present Phase II for approval at a future meeting of the Board of Trustees.

## 10. Campus Report, Chancellor Daniel W. Rahn, UAMS:

In his remark's he stated that UAMS's public purpose is to lead to a healthier future for all, better health tomorrow than today. Change is a very important part of this. UAMS is about changing the future through the care provided to people, through the education and training of the health professions workforce of the future, through the research conducted and the translation of research to improved approaches to health. The health care industry is in the midst of dramatic change and will be for some time. All providers are feeling the effects, but some challenges such as cuts in research funding are unique to academic medical centers. Much of the change UAMS has experienced this year has been positive, especially in regard to its financial situation.

WHEREAS, Professor Williams published 37 books of poetry, fiction, nonfiction, criticism, and literary translation over the course of his distinguished career as a writer; and

WHEREAS, Professor Williams received numerous awards and honors, including the Amy Lowell Award in Poetry, the Prix de Rome for Literature and the Academy Award for Literature, both from the American Academy of Arts and Letters, the John William Corrington Award for Literary Excellence, the National Arts Award, and the Lifetime Achievement Award in Writing, given by the Porter Prize Foundation; and

WHEREAS, Professor Williams founded and served as the first director of the prominent literary journal *The New Orleans Review*; and

WHEREAS, Professor Williams represented the U.S. State Department on reading and lecture tours throughout Latin America, Europe, and the Middle and Far East; was elected a fellow of the American Academy in Rome, designated Socio Benemerito dell'Associazione, Centro Romanesco Trilussa, Roma; and named by the multinational editorial board of *Voices International* one of the twenty best poets in the world writing in English; and

WHEREAS, Professor Williams co-founded the American Literary Translators Association in 1980, the preeminent professional organization for translators of poetry, fiction, and other literary works; and

## 39.5 Approval of Granting of Emeritus Status to Dr. Thomas Guyette, UAMS:

Upon motion by Trustee Rogers and second by Trustee Hyneman, the following resolution was adopted:

WHEREAS, in accordance with University of Arkansas policy, Thomas W. Guyette, Ph.D., CCC-SLP, Professor and Chair in the Department of Audiology and Speech Pathology in the College of Health Professions, is retiring on December 31, 2014; and

WHEREAS, Dr. Guyette served the department and the University of Arkansas for Medical Sciences with distinction for more than twelve years; and

WHEREAS, Dr. Guyette served the Department and College as Professor and Chair of the Department of Audiology and Speech Pathology while continuing his professional contributions to the profession; and

WHEREAS, Dr. Guyette devoted twelve years to the education and mentoring of communication sciences and disorders professionals in Arkansas, that resulted in Dr. Guyette being the recipient of the Chancellor's Teaching Award in 2010. He inspired many University of Arkansas for Medical Sciences graduates to continue their pursuit of excellence and professionalism in communication sciences and disorders. Students and alumni have praised Dr. Guyette for his effective teaching practices, research efforts and his mentorship of students in and out of the classroom; and

WHEREAS, Dr. Guyette is a true example of a master teacher and researcher whose expertise in craniofacial speech disorders and their treatment, articulation problems that result from structural differences, aerodynamic parameters of normal and disordered speech, and measurement of velopharyngeal function have been beneficial to his profession and the state. His accomplishments are exemplified by the number of graduate courses taught on cleft palate and craniofacial disorders, mentorship of numerous graduate student research projects and dissertations, publication of over twenty scholarly articles and over thirty abstracts, coauthor of six book chapters and service as the clinical speech language pathologist in otolaryngology and cleft palate clinics at Arkansas Children's Hospital. Under the leadership of Dr. Guyette as Chair of the Department of Audiology and Speech Pathology, the Doctor of Philosophy program in Communication Sciences and Disorders, the Doctor of Audiology degree

program, and the Auditory Based Intervention Certificate were developed and received approval from the Arkansas Department of Higher Education; and

WHEREAS, Dr. Guyette has engaged in service activities throughout his career by serving on committees within the College of Health Professions and in the Department of Audiology and Speech Pathology. He has competently guided the program through reaccreditation reviews, renovations and restructuring. He played a key role in the formation of the department's Development Council and the annual Jazz and Juleps fund raiser. His expertise in cleft palate and resonance disorders positioned Dr. Guyette to be an excellent representative of the College of Health Professions; and

# 1. Report of Audit and Fiscal Responsibility Committee Meeting and Approval of Bond Refunding for PCCUA:

Audit and Fiscal Responsibility Committee Chairman Mark Waldrip reported on the Committee meeting held February 12, 2015, and moved that the full Board approve the Committee report and the resolution set forth below. Trustee Rutledge seconded the motion and the following resolution was approved:

# RESOLUTION OF THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF THE UNIVERSITY OF ARKANSAS

AUTHORIZING THE ISSUANCE OF BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF THE UNIVERSITY OF ARKANSAS STUDENT FEE REFUNDING REVENUE BONDS (PHILLIPS COMMUNITY COLLEGE), FOR THE PURPOSE OF REFUNDING CERTAIN OUTSTANDING BONDS; AUTHORIZING THE EXECUTION OF AN OFFICIAL STATEMENT, BOND PURCHASE AGREEMENT, TRUST INDENTURE AND RELATED DOCUMENTS; AND PRESCRIBING OTHER MATTERS PERTAINING THERETO.

WHEREAS, the Board of Trustees (the "Board") of the University of Arkansas (the "University") is authorized under the Constitution and laws of the State of Arkansas, including particularly Arkansas Code of 1987 Annotated, Title 6, Chapter 62, Subchapter 3 (the "Act") to borrow money for the purpose of constructing and equipping capital improvements to University facilities and to refund bonds issued under the Act to finance such capital improvements; and

WHEREAS, the Board has previously issued its Student Fee Refunding and Construction Revenue Bonds (Phillips Community College), Series 2009 (the "Series 2009 Bonds"), under the Act for the purpose of financing and refinancing capital improvements on or for the Stuttgart campus of Phillips Community College of the University of Arkansas ("PCCUA"); and

WHEREAS, the Series 2009 Bonds are in the outstanding principal amount of \$10,825,000, and the Series 2009 Bonds maturing after December 1, 2016 are subject to optional redemption by the Board without penalty on and after December 1, 2016; and

WHEREAS, it has been found and determined, based on the advice of the staff of the University and PCCUA, that the Board can, based on current market conditions, recognize net present value savings by the refunding of all or portions of the outstanding Series 2009 Bonds (the "Refunding"), and that the Refunding should be financed by the Board's Student Fee Refunding Revenue Bonds (Phillips Community College) (the "Bonds"), the proceeds of the sale thereof to be used for accomplishing the Refunding and paying the costs of issuing the Bonds; and

WHEREAS, the Bonds will be general obligations of the Board, and payment of debt service on the Bonds will be specifically secured by "Pledged Revenues" which are defined as all revenues derived from the collection of tuition and student fees paid by students attending PCCUA; and

WHEREAS, in order to proceed with the financing, it is necessary for the Board (i) to authorize the issuance and marketing of the Bonds; (ii) to designate Raymond James & Associates, Inc. as underwriter for the Bonds (the "Underwriter"), (iii) to authorize the President of the University to deem final the Preliminary Official Statement for the Bonds and to authorize its use; (iv) to authorize the pricing of the Bonds and the execution of a Bond Purchase Agreement for the Bonds with the Underwriter in connection therewith; and (v) to authorize the execution of a Trust Indenture (hereinafter described) for the Bonds and related documents, all relating to the security and issuance of the Bonds;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF THE UNIVERSITY OF ARKANSAS:

Section 1. After receiving advice and the recommendation of the Vice Chancellor for Finance and Administration of PCCUA, all or any portion of the Series 2009 Bonds may be refunded if such refunding would produce an aggregate net present value savings of at least three percent (3%) of the principal balance of the Series 2009 Bonds being refunded. In the event that such net present value savings threshold is met, the Bonds are hereby authorized to be issued to accomplish the Refunding of the Series 2009 Bonds selected for the Refunding. The Bonds shall have a final maturity date not later than the final maturity date of the Series 2009 Bonds being refunded. Any Series 2009 Bonds being refunded that mature after December 1, 2016, shall be called for redemption on such date.

The Bonds shall have in their name a series designation based on the year issued and, if there are multiple series, the name shall contain a letter to differentiate series, beginning with "A".

The Bonds shall be issued in an aggregate principal amount not greater than the amount needed to accomplish the Refunding and to pay the estimated costs of issuing the Bonds and accomplishing the Refunding.

<u>Section 2.</u> In order to provide for the issuance of the Bonds and to prescribe the terms under which the Bonds will be secured, executed, authenticated, accepted and held, the Chairman, Secretary and Assistant Secretary of the Board and the President of the University are hereby authorized and directed to execute all documents necessary to the issuance of the Bonds, including, without limitation:

- (a) a Trust Indenture (the "Trust Indenture") to be dated as of the date of the Bonds, between the Board and BancorpSouth Bank, as trustee (the "Trustee"), setting forth the terms and conditions of the Bonds and providing for the issuance of the Bonds;
- (b) a Bond Purchase Agreement between the Board and the Underwriter, setting forth the purchase price and the other terms and conditions upon which the Bonds will be sold to the Underwriter; and
- (c) a Continuing Disclosure Agreement between the Board and the Trustee, setting forth certain obligations of the Board to make continuing disclosure of financial information and material events to the secondary municipal marketplace, as set forth in Rule 15c2-12 of the Securities and Exchange Commission.

The Trust Indenture, the Bond Purchase Agreement, and the Continuing Disclosure Agreement shall be in substantially the form presented to the Board with such changes as shall be approved by the Chairman or the President. The Board recognizes that certain revisions may be made to the Trust Indenture, the Bond Purchase Agreement and the Continuing Disclosure Agreement prior to the issuance of the Bonds, and hereby authorizes the Chairman or President to approve and accept such revisions, the signature of either on the Bond Purchase Agreement, the Trust Indenture and the Continuing Disclosure Agreement to constitute proof of their acceptance of such revisions. Specifically, the President or the Chairman is hereby authorized to (i) accept the final maturity schedule, interest rates and reoffering yields for the Bonds if he deems such rates, yields and maturity schedule to be appropriate and within the authority granted by this resolution to order to achieve the minimum net present value savings and execute the Bond Purchase Agreement with the Underwriter, and (ii) execute the Continuing Disclosure Agreement. Prior to the sale of the Bonds, the President or the Chairman is hereby authorized to confer with Friday, Eldredge & Clark, LLP, as bond counsel, in allocating the principal amount of the Bonds between tax-exempt bonds and taxable Board of Trustees Special Meeting February 12, 2015 Page 5

bonds if advantageous for planning purposes or necessitated for federal income tax purposes.

The President is hereby authorized to negotiate an Underwriter's discount with the Underwriter that is not in excess of 0.8% of the par amount of the Bonds. The purchase price may include original issue premiums and discounts in such amounts as may be approved by the President.

Section 3. The Board hereby authorizes the use of a Preliminary Official Statement in the marketing of the Bonds and authorizes the production of an Official Statement for the Bonds. The Preliminary Official Statement is hereby approved in substantially the form presented to the Board. The Board recognizes that certain revisions may be made to the Preliminary Official Statement prior to its delivery to prospective purchasers, and hereby authorizes the Chairman or the President to approve and accept such revisions, the signature of either on the Preliminary Official Statement to constitute proof of acceptance of such revisions. The Board hereby authorizes the President to "deem final" for purposes of Rule 15c2-12 of the Securities and Exchange Commission the Preliminary Official Statement with such revisions as may be accepted by the President. The Board hereby further authorizes and approves the production of a final Official Statement for the Bonds, and authorizes and directs the President to execute and deliver the Official Statement, in such form as he deems acceptable, in connection with the issuance of the Bonds.

Section 4. The Chairman, Secretary and Assistant Secretary of the Board, and the President of the University are hereby authorized and directed to do any and all lawful things to effect the execution and delivery of the Bonds, the performance of all obligations of the Board and of PCCUA, and the execution and delivery of all papers, documents, certificates and other instruments of whatever nature that may be necessary or desirable for carrying out the authority conferred by this resolution or evidencing the authority and its exercise. The Secretary or Assistant Secretary of the Board is hereby authorized to acknowledge and attest the signatures of the Chairman and to execute such other documents as may be required in connection with the issuance of the Bonds.

Section 5. The Board hereby expresses its intent to retain Raymond James & Associates, Inc., as Underwriter for the Bonds and Friday, Eldredge & Clark, LLP, Little Rock, Arkansas, as Bond Counsel for the Bonds ("Bond Counsel"). The President of the University and the Vice President for Finance of the University, in consultation with the Chancellor of PCCUA and the Vice Chancellor for Finance and Administration of PCCUA, are authorized to negotiate the terms and conditions of and agreements with Bond Counsel, and to execute such agreement as they determine are necessary and in the

best interest of the University. If such negotiations are unsuccessful, the President shall so inform the Board, and the Board will identify other bond counsel with whom the President of the University and the Vice President for Finance of the University, in consultation with the Chancellor of PCCUA and the Vice Chancellor for Finance and Administration of PCCUA, shall negotiate. Upon the conclusion of successful negotiations, Bond Counsel will complete documentation for the issuance of the Bonds upon such schedule and in such manner as the President of the University shall direct.

<u>Section 6</u>. The provisions of this resolution are hereby declared to be separable and if any provision shall for any reason be held illegal or invalid, such holding shall not affect the validity of the remainder of this resolution.

<u>Section 7</u>. All resolutions and parts thereof in conflict herewith are hereby repealed to the extent of such conflict.

Chancellor Daniel W. Rahn, M.D. at the University of Arkansas for Medical Sciences requests approval to purchase approximately 11 acres from the State Institutional System Board for the Arkansas Department of Human Services and Arkansas State Hospital for a purchase price of \$2,033,760 which is within appraised value.



## 6. REASON FOR PROPOSED ACTION:

The primary rationale for the DNP program was the recommendation by the American Association of Colleges of Nursing (AACN) that future advanced practice nurses should be prepared at the doctoral level. The DNP program started Fall 2013 with an emphasis on adult/geriatric acute care for post-BSN students who desired roles as advanced practice nurses (nurse practitioners or clinical nurse specialists). While the focus on this area of interest will meet the health needs of most individuals at some point in their lives, the focus on primary care services (health promotion and disease prevention) must be equally emphasized to avoid the development of chronic health problems. Of the 75 counties in Arkansas, most are designated as Medically Underserved Areas (MUAs) by the Arkansas Department of Health (2011).

With more citizens obtaining health insurance through the Affordable Care Act, it is imperative that we have healthcare providers who can identify and ameliorate risks before they become chronic health problems. Family Nurse Practitioners can provide the health care systems support included in the state's plan. They can respond to patients' needs and provide evidence-based preventive, screening and treatment services while empowering individuals in the community to take better care of themselves and their chronic conditions. This would help reduce the chances of relapse and prevent additional encounters with healthcare providers. According to the National Governors Association [NGA (2012)], it is projected that by the year 2019 the demand for primary care in the United States will increase from 15 million to up to 25 million visits annually requiring as many as 7000 providers to meet this demand. The projected increased need for

primary care services will be additional to a pre-existing shortage of primary care providers (NGA, 2012). It is estimated that over 35.2 million people who live within the 5,870 Health Professional Shortage Areas (HPSAs) in the United States do not currently receive adequate primary care services (NGA, 2012). HPSA scores have been developed by the National Health Service Corps to determine priority assignments for clinicians. These scores range from 1-25 in primary care with the higher scores representing a greater priority (HRSA, 2014). There are 75 counties in Arkansas, and HRSA (2014) reports 54 HPSA of 10 or greater which clearly demonstrates a need for increased provision of primary care in Arkansas.

## V. Proposed Courses for Family Nurse Practitioner Concentration

To create a third concentration, three new courses are proposed to prepare the student for national certification as a family nurse practitioner. Two theory courses and one clinical course are proposed for the FNP program. The number of actual clinical hours for the proposed concentration is the same as the current concentrations (1035 hours). There are 26 specialty clinical credits required for all concentrations.

The total number of credits for the post-BSN DNP program is 79 credits for all three concentrations.

#### c. New courses and new course descriptions:

The new concentration (Family Practice) requires the approval of three new courses. New Courses/Courses Descriptions:

NURS 5483 – FNP Specialty I Focuses on evidence-based models for the management of chronic health conditions in family practice, focusing on the holistic assessment and treatment of adults across the lifespan and their families. Emphasis on assessment, diagnosis and treatment of chronic conditions, and health promotion modalities. Utilizes advanced theories, concepts, knowledge, and skill in the care of diverse family populations with complex chronic conditions.

NURS 5543 – FNP Specialty II Focuses on evidence-based models for management of acute and complex conditions in family practice including women's and children's health. Incorporates holistic assessment, diagnosis and treatment, health promotion and disease

prevention modalities. Utilizes advanced theories, concepts, knowledge, and skill in the care of diverse family populations across the lifespan.

NURS 5495 – FNP Specialty Clinical II Clinical component to 5493. Focuses on the management of individuals with acute and complex health conditions including the care of women and children. Emphasis on application of theoretical concepts, assessment skills, critical thinking, and evidence-based standards to formulate differential diagnoses, clinical impressions, treatment, and evaluation plans in family practice.

- d. Documentation that program option meets employer needs The original survey of employers' need for the DNP did not distinguish graduates' specializations. Rather, it inquired as to an employer's need for a doctorally prepared advanced practice nurse. Most Arkansans receive care primary care settings than in any other settings. Graduates from the DNP program would find employment in a number of hospitals, hospital-based clinics, community clinics, MD offices, public health facilities, health corporations, schools, etc.
- e. Student demand (projected enrollment) for program option We have received a number of recent inquiries for the family practice area of interest. In our original survey for the DNP program, 62.5% of the nurses surveyed (N = 331) stated they planned on pursuing a DNP within the next 5 years and almost half (47.9%) responded that they had been waiting for Arkansas to have a DNP program. Our goal is to divide projected enrollment of 40 new students per year between the areas of interest: 20 in adult/geriatric care and 20 in family practice.

While other programs in the state (ASU, UCA, UAMS, Harding) offer preparation for family nurse practitioners at the master's level, we are the only university in the state to offer a post-BSN program of study that will lead to the DNP degree with preparation as an advanced practice nurse regardless of area of interest.

ENGL 5513: Document Design for Technical Writers (Current on-campus offering, will be offered online in the same form as on-campus). Description: Document design plays a central role in the work of technical writers as it impacts how a given text is received, read, and understood. In this course we'll investigate the way that document design has evolved over time, how it shapes and is shaped by technical writing practice, and study the principles behind rhetorically-sound document design. As part of this process, we will create a series of texts to meet real-world scenarios, ranging from manuals to catalogs to infographics. In doing so, we'll focus on using industry standard software, the Adobe Creative Suite, while backing up our design work with grounded theory and background research on the rhetorical situations we'll be writing into.

ENGL 5963: Technical Editing. Description: In this course, we'll look specifically at technical editing, a sub-genre of editing that focuses on the editing of technical documents in the workplace. Technical writers often serve in the capacity of editor in their professional lives, working with authors of complex texts to make sure those documents meet the needs of their readers as well as any organizational or legal guidelines and frameworks. In the course of our studies, we'll look at the big (and small) picture of the editing process and how we can work as technical editors to help authors bring their texts to a ready-to-publish form.

No courses will be taught by adjunct faculty.

Costs are not incurred by the Department of English for developing courses. Faculty creating courses will teach their existing load and develop the online courses in addition to that workload. The funding for developing those courses out of load is provided by Global Campus's existing funding structure. Global Campus online and Rogers campus course development is applied for through the Global Campus. If approved for a development "grant," the developer is paid \$3,448 + fringes (the Global Campus gives us \$4k to cover the total costs). Global Campus accounting transfers the funds to me, and I transfer them to the related CCN and notify the chair, the office manager, and the account holder that the funds are ready to disperse. In addition, the courses being offered once online are projected to make revenue for the university and the department virtually every semester.

Two new courses have been approved for development; they will rely on the current technologies available and supported by the Walton College with no additional costs. We are beginning the search for a clinical assistant professor focusing on analytics, and hope to have this individual join by Fall 2015. 25% (2 courses of the 8 courses per year) of this new faculty position is dedicated to these courses. (The new faculty member will teach 8 sections per year and will cover the courses as addressed in this program of study (as well as other courses). In case a faculty member is not hired for this position, during the first year (Fall 2015-Spring 2016), the program expects to add one course per semester at a cost of \$5,000/course (\$10,000) to cover adjunct faculty costs until an additional faculty position is filled and able to cover the course. One faculty member will receive a onecourse release during 2015-16 for several undergraduate and graduate tasks related to business analytics: (a) developing the two new courses (ISY 4193 and ISYS 4393) for the business analytics concentration; (b) developing, in conjunction with instructors of existing course ISYS 4293 Business Intelligence, an implementation plan for the ISYS Business Analytics Concentration; (c) developing, in coordination with WCOB Department Chairs, an implementation plan for the WCOB interdisciplinary minor in Business Analytics; (d) developing a "flex" Business Analytics Graduate Certificate offering; and (e) developing an advising plan and work as WCOB Graduate Advisor for the Business Analytics Track of the MS in Statistics and Analytics. This has been most apparent as noted in the most growing area surrounding "Big Data" and analytics; this concentration most especially addresses the situation that most business students have one class in data analytics with one possible elective in data mining. The Enterprise Systems Steering Committee members and ITRI Advisory Board members (as well as our stronger companies – Wal-Mart, Tyson Foods, and JB Hunt) have both strongly supported the development of Business Analytics at both the undergraduate and graduate levels.

Two new courses have been approved for development; they will rely on the current technologies available and supported by the Walton College with no additional costs. We are beginning the search for a clinical assistant professor focusing on analytics, and hope to have this individual join by Fall 2015. 25% (2 courses of the 8 courses per year) of this new faculty position is dedicated to these courses. (The new faculty member will teach 8 sections per year and will cover the courses as addressed in this program of study (as well as other courses). In case a faculty

member is not hired for this position, during the first year (Fall 2015-Spring 2016), the program expects to add one course per semester at a cost of \$5,000/course (\$10,000) to cover adjunct faculty costs until an additional faculty position is filled and able to cover the course. One faculty member will receive a one-course release during 2015-16 for several undergraduate and graduate tasks related to business analytics: (a) developing the two new courses (ISY 4193 and ISYS 4393) for the business analytics concentration; (b) developing, in conjunction with instructors of existing course ISYS 4293 Business Intelligence, an implementation plan for the ISYS Business Analytics Concentration; (c) developing, in coordination with WCOB Department Chairs, an implementation plan for the WCOB interdisciplinary minor in Business Analytics; (d) developing a "flex" Business Analytics Graduate Certificate offering; and (e) developing an advising plan and work as WCOB Graduate Advisor for the Business Analytics Track of the MS in Statistics and Analytics. The cost of this course release and any additional costs will be covered by Walton College and Information Systems. Other than the unfilled position, the Walton College will not request any other new funds to support this new concentration/minor as the Information Systems IT Applications Management Concentration is being deleted.

c. Program goals and objectives:

This program will help meet our industry stake holder needs with regard to hiring college graduates with poultry experience. This certificate program will be offered to students where we have established partnerships. This opportunity will contribute to the diversity of our academic program and potentially the graduate student pool. Other partnerships being developed are in-state (i.e., Southern Arkansas University-Magnolia & Arkansas State University-Jonesboro), as well as internationally (i.e., Huazhong Agriculture University-China & University of Sao Paulo-Brazil). Students will arrive in Fayetteville in May for departmental or industry internships and complete coursework during the fall and spring semesters while living in Fayetteville. The 29 hours (face-to-face program in Fayetteville) of the certificate will represent full course loads in the fall and spring, with internship credit for the summer. Although certificates will be awarded from the University of Arkansas-Fayetteville, degrees will be conferred from their home university as the credits will transfer. We are expecting two to three students every fall semester to enroll in this program. As we cultivate the program, we expect student numbers to increase per the poultry career opportunities in Northwest Arkansas. However, we want the University of Arkansas Pine Bluff to be our main student feeder into this program. With our 3 + 1 agreement executed we currently visit the University of Arkansas Pine Bluff campus once per semester, and the University of Arkansas Pine Bluff students accompany our students to the International Poultry Scientific Forum in Atlanta every January. It is fitting because both institutions represent the Land Grant Institutions of Arkansas. Moreover, new leadership at the University of Arkansas Pine Bluff is increasing student recruiting and we feel this certificate will help their efforts, and further strengthen the relationship between institutions.

Administered by the African & African American Studies Program (AAST), the certificate will involve faculty who teach within the AAST program, which contains scholars from the Departments of English, History, Drama, Political Science, Art, Sociology, Communications, Journalism, World Languages, and the School of Social Work. This group of faculty strong supports interdisciplinary teaching and research and will help provide students multiple perspectives on the study of the African diaspora. This interdisciplinary approach has the potential to open dialogue between students whose interests lie across the disciplines to help them develop a broad cultural literacy and see how the issues that Arkansans and Americans deal with each and every day surrounding race are grounded in a distinctive cultural framework and are still under construction today.

AAST 5003: Graduate Seminar in African & African American Studies (3 credits) This course will provide an introduction to the discipline of African & African American Studies by leading students through an interdisciplinary examination of the history of the discipline, research methods employed by scholars within it, and its relationship to other disciplines within the academy. Primarily, students will focus on cultural, intellectual, and economic connections among diaspora communities and the development of racial formation within the larger Atlantic World. The course will also examine political, social, and economic issues related to diaspora communities as well as across Africa.

AAST 5103: Graduate Readings in African & African American Studies (3 credits)
This independent readings course will provide students with an opportunity to study a particular topic or method within the discipline of African & African American Studies with a faculty member. Details of projects, readings, and goals will be determined by the individual student and faculty member.

### d. Program goals and objectives:

The Graduate Certificate in African & African American Studies is a 15-credit hour program conceived as a rigorous interdisciplinary study of the legacy of the African diaspora and African-descended people's global experiences with a focus on Africa, the United States, and the Caribbean. The certificate's broad-based curriculum and the participation of fifteen different faculty members across the University that will assist graduate students who choose to study the history and culture of the African diaspora. Courses in the program strive to advance social consciousness, inject principles of reason and equality into international debates, and examine the important role that race has played in the creation of the world. Students will therefore gain both the theoretical and analytic skills from a broad array of disciplines in order to advance research on multiple aspects of the African diaspora.

### e. Documentation that program meets employer needs:

Employers in both Arkansas and across the United States desire students who have a firm understanding of race and diaspora studies. As companies have recognized that the growing African American population in the United States and the growing importance of Africa as a global trading partner necessitated a growing commitment and understanding of diversity, they have begun to demand that employees have a background in African and African American studies. Students enrolled in this certificate program will gain the theoretical and scholarly background needed by employers to market, distribute, and sell a wide variety of goods and services to new markets and new customers.

### f. Student demand (projected enrollment) for program:

The African & African American Studies program sees significant demand among graduate students already concentrating in diaspora studies that would benefit from the open dialogue and interdisciplinary connections this program would bring. As stated above, the program also believes that it will help recruitment of graduate students from Arkansas and neighboring states who are interested in pursuing African diaspora studies at the graduate level. The program expects between 25 and 40 students to be enrolled in the program once it is in operation.

### g. Name of institutions offering similar program and the institutions used as a model to develop the proposed program:

To gather information to create the University of Arkansas' African and African American Studies Program Graduate Certificate, the AAST programs of the 107 other Research Universities that held the Carnegie rank of Very High Research Activity were examined. Of those, 22 sponsored a certificate program, 17 possessed a graduate program other than a certificate (an MA or PhD Program), 59 had no graduate component, and 9 had no African American Studies/Ethnic Studies/Africana Studies program at the undergraduate or graduate level.

Rationale for this proposal includes a) advances in geographic science over the last several decades, b) MS Geography prevalence among peer universities with "very high research activity" based on the Carnegie Classification of Institutions of Higher Education, c) a 20-year sustained partnership between the Department of Geosciences and the Center for Advanced Spatial Technologies (CAST) which is directed by a member of the Geosciences faculty, d) interest in an MS among current and prospective graduate students (current enrollment in the MA Geography is 24 but we project with an MS Geography this will increase to 30+ within three years), e) unanimous interest among Geosciences faculty, and f) the ability to better complement existing faculty expertise and to offer greater synergy with the geoinformatics (i.e. geographic information science or GIS) emphasis of the PhD degree program in Geosciences launched in Fall 2012.

The Occupational Information Network (O\*NET) extensive survey results, sponsored by US Department of Labor/Employment and Training Administration, detail specific knowledge, skills, and abilities related to geography and related areas of employment in the United States. According to O\*NET, "Geographers" will experience a rapid "employment increase of 22% or more" from 2012-2022, will need "science" skills, knowledge of "calculus, statistics, and their applications", and the ability to "develop, operate, and maintain geographical information (GIS) computer systems" (http://www.onetonline.org/link/summary/19-3092.00). Even greater quantitative and computational skills are required for a number of related occupations, such as "Geospatial Information Scientists Technologists" and (http://www.onetonline.org/link/summary/15-1199.04), which is a key area of focus for geography and geosciences graduate students at University of Arkansas. It is useful to compare geography degree programs with GIS capacity offered at peer institutions. Many of these

programs, with a majority offering an MS degree, are listed by the Urban and Regional Information Systems (URISA; http://www.urisa.org/careers/colleges-and-universities/). A National Research Council report titled "Understanding the Changing Planet: Strategic Directions for the Geographical Sciences" (http://www.nap.edu/catalog.php?record\_id=12860) provides broader economic and societal rationale for geographic science preparation in both human and physical geography.

### 6. REASON FOR PROPOSED PROGRAM CONSOLIDATION/RECONFIGURATION:

With the increased demand for Internet design and development professionals, students are looking for programs that address the varied skillset required to be successful in the field. Currently, students wishing to pursue credentialing in this area must piece together course work from selected programs from around the campus. This approach is dependent on good advising and knowing where to look on campus for applicable courses. This degree attempts to bring all relevant coursework in the field into a high-demand degree program relevant to current market demands.

This program fully aligns with the overall strategic economic development goals of the state. As referred to by the State of Arkansas Integrated Workforce Plan for Program Years 2012 – 2016, the Arkansas Economic Development Commission (AEDC) has outlined a targeted industry business strategy that is designed to transition the state's economy to one supported by higher-paying knowledge-based jobs. One of the niche areas identified by AEDC as a continuing

investment opportunity and growing industry is Information Technology, and more specifically in areas such as:

- a. Data Centers
- b. Software Development and Data Management Services
- c. Technical Support Centers
- d. Telecommunications

These focus areas intrinsically incorporate Web/App development as a much needed skillset that would fuel this targeted growth.

Other indicators of the need for program graduates include:

- UAMS Bioventures is currently attempting to build a working group which connects
  entrepreneurially minded faculty who have ideas and needs for mobile apps with
  programmers in the community who can develop these apps. In a meeting held on October 9,
  2013 with interested faculty and community partners, one of the largest obstacles identified
  by entrepreneurs was the lack of talented developers/designers who possess the necessary
  understanding of how to design, build, and market a mobile app.
- Arkansas has developed a core "area of expertise" in ecommerce, built largely from the success of Acumen Holdings in Northwest Arkansas, and the resulting spinoff companies from those who have left Acumen for their own entrepreneurial initiatives. Acumen now employs over 200 people, and they routinely struggle with access to highly-trained web developers and designers.
- A number of entrepreneurial initiatives have formed in Arkansas over the past five years, including The ARK Challenge and Startup Weekends. Each of these latter two programs focuses on empowering the launch of IT-based companies. Some entrepreneurs recruited into the ARK Challenge have raised the question as to whether they can find development talent, if their company grows successfully. In any event, the startup companies launched from these programs will increase the future demand for designers and developers.
- An early-stage private equity fund called "Fund for Arkansas' Future" has the mission of investing in early stage, Arkansas-based technology companies. In 2013, this fund has made investments in six companies, five of which are ecommerce or related companies, and all of which are seeking to hire designers and developers. The investment activity in the state clearly points to ecommerce and other related IT fields as a rapidly developing industry.

To support the application for this program, a survey was distributed to ten Central Arkansas companies who employ web designers and developers. 66% of the respondents indicated there is a "strong need" for graduates with such skills and expertise, and 78% indicated the demand for these individuals will "significantly increase" over the next five to ten years. Even more encouraging, over half the employers indicated a desire to partner with UALR in some way (providing speakers, mentors, hiring interns, etc.) as they see the strategic value of the program and its relevance to the business community.



### 4. PROGRAM SUMMARY:

The Bachelor of Social Work (BSW) at the University of Arkansas - Fort Smith is congruent with the institution's mission and strategic plan. The BSW program will prepare students to succeed in an ever-changing global world. It is designed to facilitate economic development and quality of place in the greater Fort Smith area through the education and training of social work professionals in assessing the unique needs of individuals, couples, families, groups and organizations. This generalist program is also designed to prepare the student for state licensure and professional practice in the broad field of social work as well as to prepare them to enter graduate programs in social work.

The BSW program will maintain accountability via the national accreditation board for social work—the Council on Social Work Education (CSWE). Program assessment will be implemented in accordance with the State of Arkansas Department of Higher Education and the CSWE guidelines that govern curriculum development, revision, and improvement in student learning. An effective advising model will guide BSW majors in the attainment of their academic and professional goals. The program will emphasize ethics for the discipline and broaden the students' understanding of the significance of cultural and global awareness. This goal will be accomplished, in part, via required courses unique to these topics, the completion of the State of Arkansas Child Maltreatment Training Certification, and as content in other core social work (SOWK) courses. The BSW program will be supported by the UAFS information technology department which provides assistance ranging from smart class rooms and computer labs to course access via online, hybrid, and web-enhanced formatted course offerings. As a part of course content and field practicum, select SOWK-prefixed courses will address the goals of the profession, teach critical thinking, research methods, and the application of critical assessment. BSW majors will be trained in the principles of logic, scientific inquiry, and discernment in this generalist program via supervised field practicums and associated courses. This BSW degree program is designed in accordance with the CSWE description for a BSW (generalist) program;

Educational Policy B2.2—Generalist Practice

Generalist practice is grounded in the liberal arts and the person and environment construct. To promote human and social well-being, generalist practitioners use a range of prevention and intervention methods in their practice with individuals, families, groups, organizations, and communities. The generalist practitioner identifies with the social work profession and applies ethical principles and critical thinking in practice. Generalist practitioners incorporate diversity in their practice and advocate for human rights and social and economic justice. They recognize, support, and build on the strengths and resiliency of all human beings. They engage in research-informed practice and are proactive in responding to the impact of context on professional practice. BSW practice incorporates all of the core competencies. [CSWE - Educational Policy and Accreditation Standards: <a href="http://www.cswe.org/File.aspx?id=13780">http://www.cswe.org/File.aspx?id=13780</a>.

Emphasis areas currently offered at UAFS that support the proposed program include the general education core classes in English, Rhetoric, Speech, Math, Philosophy, Biology, Chemistry, Physical Science, Music, Art, Humanities, Political Science, Psychology, Sociology, Economics, Anthropology, Criminal Justice, Religion, Statistics, and Management.

### 5. NEED FOR THE PROGRAM:

To determine general student interest and intention to enroll, UAFS anonymously surveyed 716 UAFS students enrolled in PSYC 1001 Psychology Orientation, PSYC 1163 General Psychology, PSYC 2963 Developmental Psychology: A Life Span, and declared Psychology majors during the spring 2014 semester. After reading a statement of informed consent and agreeing to participate, the students completed the brief survey that asked of their interest in several careers and agencies where social workers are hired. Additionally, we inquired of the probability of a major change should we offer a Bachelor of Social Work degree.

The results were that 162 students responded over a 3-day period where 63.6% (98) responded that they would likely change their major should we offer a Bachelor of Social Work at UAFS. Eleven of the 162 respondents stated they would not change due to their upcoming graduation date. Seventeen of the 162 respondents stated that they would not change majors.

In addition, we conducted an employer survey to determine interest and need for social workers, job titles, education, salary, availability, and skill preferences. Eleven agencies responded and reported that jobs employing social workers include but are not limited to: case workers/managers, drug court counselors, forensic interviewers, therapists, and waiver coordinators. In this region of the state, employees with at least a BSW earn and can expect to earn an average annual salary ranging from approximately \$30,000 (\$25,000-38,000) to an average of approximately \$37,000 (\$30,000-49,000). One agency (Perspectives) required a minimum degree of Master's in Social Work (MSW) and was therefore not included in the above noted statistics. The current number of positions for social workers employed in these agencies range from 3 to 70, varying with smaller agencies (e.g., Stepping Stone) and those with high turnover rates (e.g., Department of Health and Human Services). Predicted creation of new positions in these agencies varied. All agencies reported a willingness to support UAFS BSW majors with internship opportunities toward degree compliance. Most noted a preference for those with online technology savviness and analytical reasoning skills, along with excellent verbal and written communication skills.

As a result of our initial meeting with the eleven agencies noted above, seven agreed to serve on the program's Advisory Board. The board will assist in program development, provide professional support and expertise, and provide a forum for ongoing exchanges between the professional social work community, the community-at-large, and the UAFS BSW program. They will support the

educational endeavors and integrity of the UAFS BSW program and facilitate our adherence to the UAFS Strategic Plan. The Board will meet semi-annually, essentially once in the fall semester and once during the spring semester. The membership shall include representatives from public and private social service agencies, alumni, the business community, and a BSW major selected by the BSW faculty. UAFS BSW program faculty members will serve as non-voting members of the Advisory Board. The BSW program director, the department head, and another BSW faculty designee shall serve as liaisons to the Board.

Since the social work profession pervades several disciplines, we anticipate interest from majors in Psychology, Criminal Justice, Education, as well as majors in the health professions. In these initial years, we expect BSW program applications to be in moderately large numbers. Our program admissions criteria will serve as a tool to maintain the full-time-equivalent 1:25 faculty-to-student ratio required in the CSWE guidelines. Therefore, in our initial years, (1) considering that those accepted into the program after changing majors are likely to have completed eligible general education program requirements, (2) those entering as freshmen, and (3) addressing the FTE ratio, it is reasonable to project at least 20 program graduates per academic year in years three, four, and five.

Admission will be selective. Students must be admitted before taking advanced BSW courses.

Required Academic Performance: An overall GPA of 2.5 must be maintained across courses used toward degree compliance. No course grades of D in any SOWK-prefixed course (or courses used as a substitute) can be applied toward degree compliance. Student will hold a provisional admission status until full admission to the BSW degree program has been achieved and will return to a provisional status should the student not maintain the required standard of achievement for BSW majors. In addition, students must have an overall 2.5 GPA in order to enter their Field Practicum (Field Instruction and Laboratory I & II). Students must have at least a 2.5 GPA overall to graduate from the BSW program at UAFS.

The total number of semester credit hours required for the program, including prerequisite courses is 120 semester credit hours.

Institutional and program area/degree major requirements total 85 semester hours.

Five of those institutions are located in the Little Rock area and to its east, essentially, in central and eastern Arkansas. The remaining two are located on the western-most boarder of the state. The latter is significant to our proposal in that the geographic location of programs and services on the western-most portion of Arkansas is sparse, i.e., one hour north of Fort Smith and more than four hours to our south (Figure 1 below). According to our Advisory Board, services are largely sparse within a 1 hour 20 minute radius of UAFS (Figure 2 below).

WHEREAS, the contemplated activities will generate funds to be paid to the University for housing and meals and for the use of other institutional facilities which will be used to help support the auxiliary functions of the campuses serving to enroll students;

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED THAT the campus whose employees are conducting the aforesaid camps shall make certain that policies and contractual provisions are in place to assure that all applicable laws and regulations dealing with mandatory reporting of suspected child maltreatment are followed, that appropriate staffing patterns are utilized, that personnel involved in the conduct of such camps receive instruction in applicable policies, procedures, laws and regulations regarding protection of children, and further that campus officials shall assure that persons involved in the conduct of such camps have undergone criminal background checks (including registered sex offender checks). The President may furnish guidelines for matters to be included in such policies and contractual provisions.
