## 3.1 Approval of the Safety Management Report, UAMS:

Dr. Roxane Townsend presented the Safety Management Report for the period October through December 2014.

#### 3.2 Trauma Program Presentation, UAMS:

Dr. Ron Robertson, Medical Director of UAMS Trauma Program, presented an overview of the UAMS Trauma Program.

## 3.3 Review of the Performance Improvement and Patient Safety Report, UAMS:

Dr. Chris Cargile presented the Performance Improvement and Patient Safety Report for March 2015. The Joint Commission arrived on December 15, 2014 for the unannounced full accreditation survey. The final report yielded three direct findings and four indirect findings. The Evidence of Standards for all findings has been submitted and UAMS has received acceptance for the corrective actions.

## 3.4 Review of UAMS Clinical Enterprise Key Indicators, UAMS.

Dr. Townsend presented the UAMS Medical Center Board Scorecard. Mr. Dan Riley reviewed UAMS Medical Center's and Faculty Group Practice key workload indicators for the period ending January 2015.

#### 3.5 Chief Executive Officer's Update, UAMS:

Dr. Townsend discussed the capacity challenges in the UAMS Medical Center. In order to try to address these challenges a Request for Qualifications has been released to identify a firm to complete a financial feasibility study regarding building a South Tower on the Medical Center as well as a free standing Ambulatory Surgery Center on the property in West Little Rock already owned by UAMS.

 Report on Buildings and Grounds Committee Meeting Held March 17, 2015, and Approval of Actions Taken:

Chair Goodson reported that the Buildings and Grounds Committee met on March 17, 2015 and moved that the actions of the Committee be approved by the Board; Trustee Broughton seconded the motion, and the following resolutions were adopted:

5.1 Approval of Purchase of Property Located at 3300 Fair Park Boulevard, Little Rock, UALR:

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF THE UNIVERSITY OF ARKANSAS THAT the Board hereby approves an Offer and Acceptance with Larry and Mary Barnett dated January 9, 2015, for the purchase price of \$232,500 and on other terms and conditions set forth in the Offer and Acceptance to purchase certain property located at 3300 Fair Park Boulevard, Little Rock, Arkansas, more particularly described as follows:

Lot A, Block 2 Toska Leymer Addition to the City of Little Rock, Pulaski County, Arkansas. Less and Except: Part of Lot "A": Block 2, being a replat of the East 150 feet of the North Half of Lot 2 of the Toska Leymer Addition to the City of Little Rock, Pulaski County, Arkansas, being more particularly described as follows: Beginning at the Northeast corner of said Lot "A", said corner being situated on the existing West right of way line of Fair Park Boulevard; thence South 11° 51' 11" East, along the existing West right of way line 147.84 feet to the Southeast comer of said Lot "A"; thence South 78° 3' 17" West along the South line of said Lot "A", 11.80 feet to a point on the proposed West right of way line of Fair Park Boulevard; thence North 14° 28' 11" West along the proposed West right of way line 60.30 feet to the point of curvature of a 266.0-foot radius curve to the left and a distance of 90.27 feet having a chord bearing and distance of North 24° 11' 32" West, 89.84 feet; thence along the arc of said curve and the proposed West night of way line of Fair Park Boulevard to a point on the North line of said Lot "A"; thence North 78° 35' 17" East along said North line 33.75 feet to the point of beginning and containing 2,680 square feet or 0.06 acres, more or less. All of said land contains 19,496 square feet or 0.45 acres, more or less.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED THAT the purchase shall be subject to a determination by the General Counsel that the seller has good and merchantable title to the property and obtaining an acceptable Phase I environmental assessment unless waived by campus officials after inspection of the property. The Vice President for Administration, the Vice Chancellor for Finance and Administration of the University of Arkansas at Little Rock, or their designee, shall be, and hereby are, authorized to take such further action and execute such documents and instruments as may be necessary to close the transaction in accordance with the Offer and Acceptance.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED THAT the appropriate officials of the University of Arkansas at Little Rock, shall be, and hereby are, authorized to contract for the demolition and removal of structures situated upon the property at such time as deemed appropriate.

5.2 Approval to Grant an Easement to the City of Fayetteville (Town Branch Trail thru Road Hog Park Property), UAF:

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF THE UNIVERSITY OF ARKANSAS THAT the Chairman and Secretary shall be, and hereby are, authorized to execute and deliver to the City of Fayetteville, Arkansas, a non-exclusive, permanent easement for the construction, maintenance, repair and/or replacement of a multi-use trail, on, over, across, and through the following described property situated in Washington County, Arkansas, to wit:

#### PROPERTY DESCRIPTION

A part of the Northeast Quarter (NE1/4) of the Southeast Quarter (SE1/4) of Section Twenty (20) and a part of the Northwest Quarter (NW1/4) of the Southwest Ouarter (SW1/4) of Section Twenty-one (21), all in Township Sixteen (16) North, Range Thirty (30) West, being more particularly described as follows: From the NE Corner of the NE¼ of the SE¼ of said Section 20, thence South 2° 53' 47" West 41.40 feet to the point of beginning, said point being on the South right of way line of Arkansas Highway 16 (15th Street) thence along said South right of way line South 87° 13' 49" East 418.02 feet to the West line of the Center Addition; thence along the West line of the Center Addition South 37° 05' 49" West 1100.20 feet to the West angle point of the Center Addition; thence continuing along the West line of the Center Addition South 2° 29' 12" West 370.42 feet to the South Line of the NE¼ of the SE¼ of said Section 20; thence along said South line North 86° 59' 28" West 1091.35 feet to the East right of way line of the Arkansas & Missouri Railroad, said point being South 89° 59' 28" East 31.02 feet from the SW corner of the NE1/4 of the SE1/4 of said Section 20, thence Northeasterly along a curving East railroad right of way line a distance of 436.87 feet (Chord: North 8° 3' 44" East 436.76 feet) thence continuing along said East railroad right of way North 79° 13' 28" West 25.00 feet; thence Northeasterly along a curving East railroad right of way line a distance of 837.49 feet (Chord; North 14° 11' 40" East 837.32 feet) to the South right of way line of Arkansas Highway 16 (15th Street) thence along said South right of way line South 87° 35' 35" East 213.20 feet; thence South 80° 49° 43" East 251.80 feet; thence North 87° 11' 29" East 453.20 feet; thence South 87° 13' 49" East 179.55 feet to the point of beginning, containing 35.79 acres, more or less, Washington County, Arkansas, subject to all easements and/or rights of way of record.

#### PERMANENT EASEMENT DESCRIPTION:

A twenty-five foot (25') wide trail easement being of equal and uniform width having sidelines to be lengthened or shortened to terminate at the Southerly line of the Northeast Quarter (1/4) of the Southeast Quarter (SE 1/4) of Section Twenty (20), Township Sixteen (16) North, Range Thirty (30) West, Washington County, Arkansas and terminating at the Easterly right-of-way of the Burlington Northern and Santa Fe Railway as described in Instrument No. 2001-28071 as filed with the Circuit Clerk of said county; the centerline of said easement being described as follows: Commencing at

the Southeast corner of said Section Twenty (20); thence along the Easterly line of said section North 03°02'07" East 1319.20 feet to a found iron pin being the Southeast corner of said Northeast Quarter (NE 1/4) of the Southeast Quarter (SE 1/4) of said section; thence along the Southerly line of said tract North 86°58'22" West 619.07 feet to the POINT OF BEGINNING; thence North 52°59'20" West 105.56 feet to the beginning of a curve to the left having a delta angle of 43°10'28" and a radius of 200 feet: thence along said curve an arc length of 150.71 feet and a chord bearing and distance of North 74°34'34" West 147.17 feet, thence South 83°50'12" West 176.41 feet to the beginning of a curve to the right having a delta angle of 26°12'13" and a radius of 200.00 feet, thence along said curve an arc length of 91.47 feet and a chord bearing and distance of North 83°03'41" West 90.67 feet; thence North 69°57'35" West 2.57 feet to the beginning of a curve to the right having a delta angle of 55°08'14" and a radius of 200.00 feet; thence along said curve an arc length of 192.47 feet and a chord bearing and distance of North 42°23'28" West 185.12 feet; thence North 14°49'20" West 61.61 feet to said Easterly railway right-of-way being the terminus, said point being North 02°57'21" East 257.88 feet and South 87°02'39" East 51.69 feet from a found iron pin being the Southwest corner of said Northeast Quarter (NE 1/4) of the Southeast Quarter (SE 1/4) of said section; containing 19,509 square feet, more or less.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED THAT the easement shall be in a form and content approved by the General Counsel.

5.3 Approval of the Selection of Two On-Call Civil Engineering Firms, UAF:

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF THE UNIVERSITY OF ARKANSAS THAT the University of Arkansas, Fayetteville, is authorized to select McClelland Consulting Engineers and Development Consultants, Inc. to provide on-call civil engineering services for professional services contracts to fill two contract positions at the University of Arkansas, Fayetteville.

5.4 Approval of Purchase of Approximately 11 Acres of Property from the Department of Human Services, UAMS:

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF THE UNIVERSITY OF ARKANSAS THAT the Board hereby approves an Offer and Acceptance dated February 13, 2015 and accepted February 20, 2015 to purchase 11 acres, more or less, from the State Institutional System Board for the Arkansas Department of Human Services and the Arkansas State Hospital for the purchase price of \$2,033,760 and on other terms

contained in the Offer and Acceptance. Subject to obtaining a survey by the parties, the property is described as follows:

Fullerton Hall – 2.15 acres, more or less, with an address of 4501 West 7<sup>th</sup> Street, Little Rock, Pulaski County, Arkansas;

Rick's Armory – 4.85 acres, more or less, with an address of 790 South Palm Street, Little Rock, Pulaski County, Arkansas;

Red Cross – 3.07 acres, more or less, with an address of 401 South Monroe Street, Little Rock, Pulaski County, Arkansas; and

Entergy Substation – 1.02 acres, more or less, with an address of 4701 West 7<sup>th</sup> Street, Little Rock, Pulaski County, Arkansas.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED THAT the purchase is subject to obtaining a determination by the General Counsel that the Seller has good and merchantable title to the property. The Vice President for Administration, the Vice Chancellor for Finance and Administration of the University of Arkansas for Medical Sciences or their designee, shall be, and hereby are, authorized to take such further action and execute such documents and instruments as may be necessary to close the transaction in accordance with the Offer and Acceptance.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED THAT appropriate officials at the University of Arkansas for Medical Sciences shall be, and hereby are, authorize to contract for the demolition and removal of structures or parts thereof situated upon the property at such time that it is deemed appropriate.

## 5.5 Approval to Accept a Donation of Property Located at 111 North 3<sup>rd</sup> Street, Van Buren, UAFS:

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF THE UNIVERSITY OF ARKANSAS THAT the Board hereby approves a Gift Agreement dated March 6, 2015 for the donation to the Board for the use and benefit of the University of Arkansas at Fort Smith by Sandra Kay Cobb Pearson, Melissa Cobb Wick and Christopher Wick of the following described property situated in Van Buren, Crawford County, Arkansas, to wit:

Lots 11, 12, 13, 14, 15 and 16 in Block 9, Original Town of Van Buren, Arkansas, LESS AND EXCEPT, the Northeast 22 feet of Lot 11, joining Lot 10, being a part of the Fractional Section 25, Township 9 North, Range 32 West. Subject to easements, rights of way, restrictions and previous mineral

rights, if any. The Property also known as being situated at 111 North 3<sup>rd</sup> Street, Van Buren, Crawford County, Arkansas.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED THAT acceptance of the property is conditioned upon an opinion of the General Counsel that the donors have good and merchantable fee simple title to the property and that there are no covenants, conditions or other restrictions that would materially affect the merchantability of the property or the Board's intended use thereof.

## 5.6 Approval of the Naming of the Don Tyson Center for Agricultural Sciences, AGRI:

WHEREAS, Don Tyson is recognized as one of the great agricultural and entrepreneurial leaders of this generation, and his involvement in, and commitment to, agriculture in Arkansas is legendary, having been first introduced to the poultry industry in 1944 – at age 14 – as a chicken catcher and truck driver at his family's company and rising to become the company's chief executive officer from 1967 to 1991, its chairman from 1991 to 1995, and its senior chairman from 1995 until his retirement in 2001, at which time the company grew to become one of the largest manufacturing companies in the world; and

WHEREAS, Tyson Foods, Inc., with headquarters in Springdale, Arkansas and one of the world's largest producers of chicken, beef, pork and prepared foods, was founded in 1935 by John W. Tyson, whose family has continued to lead the business with his son, Don Tyson, guiding the company for many years and grandson, John H. WHEREAS, Tyson Foods and the Tyson Family recognize the value of the University of Arkansas System Division of Agriculture and the positive impact for that key industry through the research done by the Arkansas Agricultural Experiment Station and the educating performed by the Cooperative Extension Service, advancing the stewardship of natural resources and the environment, cultivating the improvement of agriculture and agribusiness, developing leadership skills and productive citizenship among youth and adults, enhancing economic security and financial responsibility among the citizens of the state, ensuring a safe, nutritious food supply, improving the quality of life in communities across Arkansas, and strengthening Arkansas families; and

#### 10. Campus Report: Joel E. Anderson, University of Arkansas at Little Rock:

Chancellor Joel E. Anderson welcomed the Board to the UALR campus and expressed what a privilege it is to host the Trustees for their meeting. Dr. Anderson stated that higher education is facing an interesting time with all of the changes in federal and state regulations, increased costs, declining enrollment, and increased demands. He stated that

higher education is resilient and UALR like other institutions will adapt and be better in the long run.

He stated that, although budget reductions have occurred, decisions regarding the budget were made to least impact students. Dr. Anderson highlighted several of the national awards and accomplishments that students and faculty have received since August. Some of the highlights were:

A team of students from the College of Business won first place following their winning presentation in a national branding competition at the AT&T World Headquarters in December. They were mentored by Dr. Gary Geissler.

In February, Senior Lafayette DeRamus won first place in nanotechnology and physics at the National Science Foundation's Emerging Researchers Conference in Washington, D.C. Junior Jeffrey Jones received first place in the engineering category at the same conference. They were mentored by Dr. Alex Biris and Dr. Shawn Bourdo, both of whom are UALR alums.

A student team from the UALR William H. Bowen School of Law defeated the University of Kentucky to earn one of 28 spots in the finals of the National Trial Competition. Another team placed 6<sup>th</sup> at the regional level. The teams were led by Michael Johnson and Hugh Finkelstein.

The UALR Ethics Bowl Team won the "Spirit of the Ethics Bowl" Award at the 19<sup>th</sup> Annual Intercollegiate Ethics Bowl in Costa Mesa, California. The team was ranked 22<sup>nd</sup> nationally. Their faculty advisors are Dr. Allison Merrick and Dr. Roxy Green.

Gus Leeper, a senior basketball player, spoke about his experience at UALR and the benefits of attending the institution. Mr. Leeper is a double major in international business and business management and has earned a GPA of 3.98. He has already secured employment at Stephens, Inc. upon his graduation in May.

# 37.4 Approval of Early Retirement Agreement for Dr. Roger Rank, UAMS:

Upon motion by Trustee von Gremp and second by Trustee Rutledge, the following resolution was adopted:

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF THE UNIVERSITY OF ARKANSAS THAT the early retirement of Roger G. Rank, Ph.D., Professor of Microbiology and Immunology, University of Arkansas Medical Sciences, is hereby approved.

BE IT EURTHER RESOLVED THAT Roger G. Rank must resign his position effective no later than May 31, 2015, and relinquish all tenure rights. In return, the University of Arkansas for Medical Sciences will provide the following for the benefit of Roger G. Rank:

- Contribute \$101,182 to Dr. Rank's University of Arkansas TIAA-CREF 403(b)
  Retirement Plan in lump sum annual installments as follows: \$40,182 in July
  2015, \$53,000 in April 2016, and \$8,000 in January 2017. In the event of Dr.
  Rank's death prior to the contributions of \$101,182 being paid in full, the
  remainder of the payments shall be made to the personal representative of Dr.
  Rank's estate in a lump sum.
- 2. Pay the full cost (employee and employer contributions) of The University of Arkansas Medical Benefit Plan and/or The University of Arkansas System UHC MAPD PPO or such other medical benefit plan the University may sponsor, up to but not exceeding \$42,013, for Dr. Rank, his wife Sigrun Simons-Rank, and his eligible children, from Dr. Rank's retirement through the date this pool is exhausted, with the following additional conditions:

- Dr. Rank will be responsible for any insurance premium costs of the University of Arkansas Medical Benefit Plan that exceed \$42,013.
- b. The \$42,013 will function as a pool of funds available for medical insurance premiums. These funds may not be converted to cash. Should Dr. Rank choose to adjust his medical insurance to a more or less expensive plan, coverage will be extended until the \$42,013 pool is exhausted. Should Dr. Rank leave the medical plan, by choice, before the pool is exhausted, any balance in the pool will return to UAMS. Should Dr. Rank die before the pool is exhausted, his wife, Sigrun Simons-Rank will be given the option to continue the coverage until the pool is exhausted as long as Ms. Simons-Rank does not remarry. If Ms. Simons-Rank decides not to continue the coverage or she remarries, any balance in the pool will return to UAMS.
- c. At such time that the \$42,013 pool is exhausted, Dr. Rank will assume direct responsibility for the full cost of the Medical Benefit Plan, should he choose to continue it.
- d. If the University ceases to offer Dr. Rank retiree health insurance at any time prior to the pool of funds being exhausted, any amounts remaining will be distributed to Dr. Rank as a stipend, less withholding for applicable state, federal and FICA/Medicare taxes, if applicable.
- 3. Pay the full cost (employer and employee contributions) of the University of Arkansas Dental Benefit Plan or such other dental benefit plan the University may sponsor, up to but not exceeding \$4,055, for coverage for Dr. Rank, his wife Sigrun Simons-Rank, and his eligible children, from Dr. Rank's retirement through the date this pool is exhausted, with the following additional conditions:
  - Dr. Rank will be responsible for any insurance premium costs of the University of Arkansas Dental Benefit Plan that exceed \$4,055.
  - b. The \$4,055 will function as a pool of funds available for dental insurance premiums. These funds may not be converted to cash. Should Dr. Rank choose to adjust his dental insurance to a more or less expensive plan, coverage will be extended until the \$4,055 pool is exhausted. Should Dr. Rank leave the dental plan, by choice, before the pool is exhausted, any balance in the pool will return to UAMS. Should Dr. Rank die before the pool is exhausted, his wife, Sigrun Simons-Rank, will be given the option to continue the coverage until the pool is exhausted as long as Ms. Simons-Rank does not remarry. If

Ms. Simons-Rank decides not to continue the coverage or she remarries, any balance in the pool will return to UAMS.

- c. At such time that the \$4,055 pool is exhausted, Dr. Rank will assume direct responsibility for the full cost of the Dental Benefit, should he choose to continue it.
- d. If the University ceases to offer Dr. Rank retiree dental insurance at any time prior to the pool of funds being exhausted, any amounts remaining will be distributed to Dr. Rank as a stipend, less withholding for applicable state, federal and FICA/Medicare taxes, if applicable.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED THAT Roger G. Rank be provided a period of at least seven (7) days following execution of the Early Retirement Agreement by the Chairman of the Board within which to revoke the agreement as required by applicable law.

#### RESOLUTION

WHEREAS, the Board of Trustees of the University of Arkansas recognizes and esteems Dr. Arthur McCracken Harding, who served from 1941 to 1947 as the University's twelfth president and who, by virtue of his birth in Pine Bluff in 1884, was the first native Arkansan to hold that position; and

WHEREAS, the Board further recognizes that Dr. Harding, who earned a Bachelor of Arts from the University in 1904 and subsequently earned Master of Arts and Doctor of Philosophy degrees from the University of Chicago, previously had served the University as a professor and in administrative positions from 1905 to 1941; and

WHEREAS, Dr. Harding was a recognized scholar who co-authored college textbooks on mathematics, wrote for general audience a best-selling book on astronomy, and traveled the U.S. and Canada lecturing on basic astronomy; and

WHEREAS, before becoming its president, Dr. Harding had served the University as examiner and registrar in addition to serving for 22 years at the helm of its General Extension Division (the forerunner of the University's School of Continuing Education and Academic Outreach) where he developed the offering of courses through correspondence and at off-campus sites throughout the state, helped start a University radio station that he managed for 10 years, promoted the formation of a statewide high school debating league, offered advanced training to the state's public school teachers and a course in legislative procedures for incoming freshmen legislators in the state's General Assembly, and otherwise engaged in pioneering work to ensure that the University of Arkansas benefited all parts of the state; and

WHEREAS, Dr. Harding saw the value to the University of engaged alumni and served as secretary of the Arkansas Alumni Association for 25 years, edited the first alumni directory, and founded an alumni magazine that he edited for 20 years; and

WHEREAS, as its president, Dr. Harding led the University throughout the trying years of World War II, which were fraught with shortages of faculty, classrooms, laboratories, and housing, and ably directed the University's efforts to incorporate into its academic programs practical training for future soldiers while accommodating returning veterans; and

WHEREAS, Dr. Harding's record of accomplishments in academia and his inspirational public service as an innovative administrator in higher education reflected great credit upon himself, the University of Arkansas, and his native state;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF THE UNIVERSITY OF ARKANSAS THAT the University formally expresses its deep appreciation for the many enduring contributions to the University and to the state of Arkansas that resulted from the decades of leadership and service of Arthur McCracken Harding by naming as Arthur M. Harding Hall the building on the Fayetteville campus currently designated as Northwest Quad-D. With this naming, the University posthumously honors Dr. Harding for the enduring, living legacy he created at the University of Arkansas.

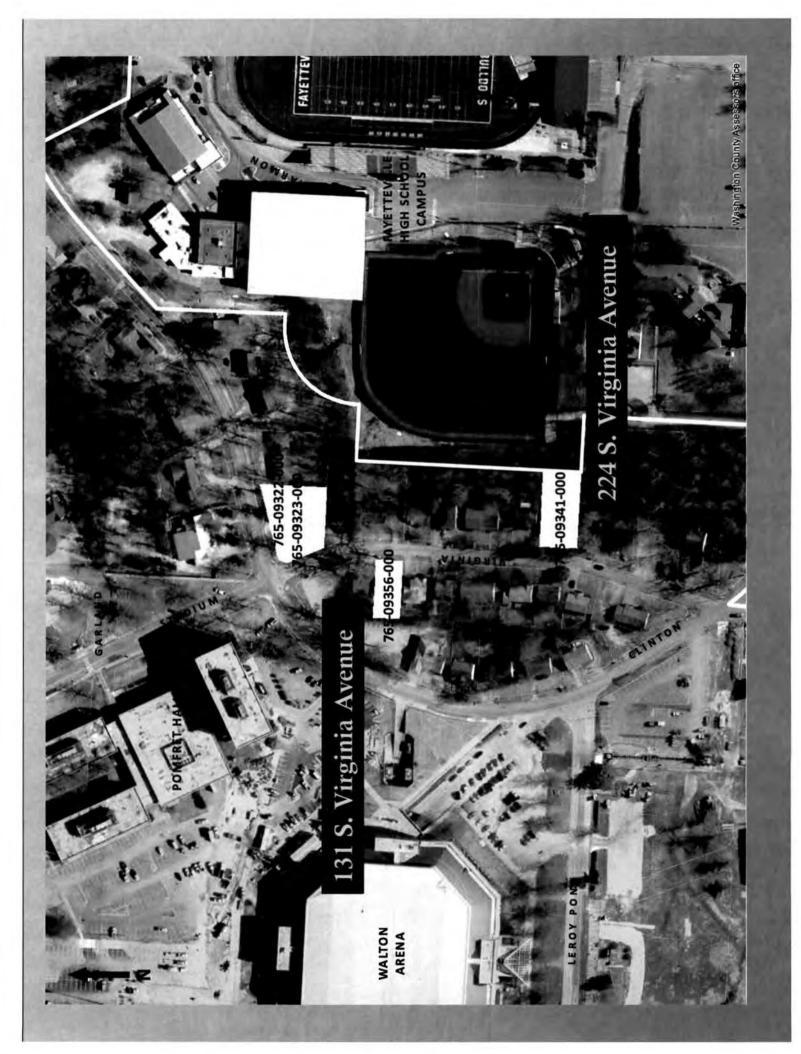

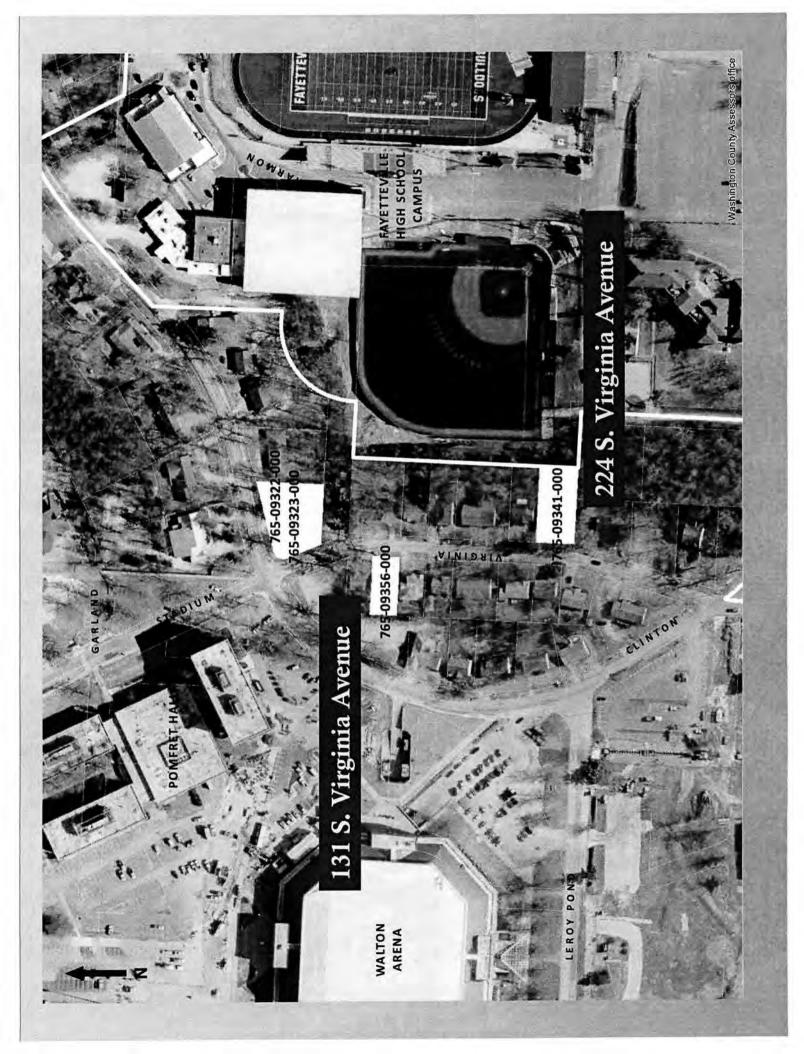

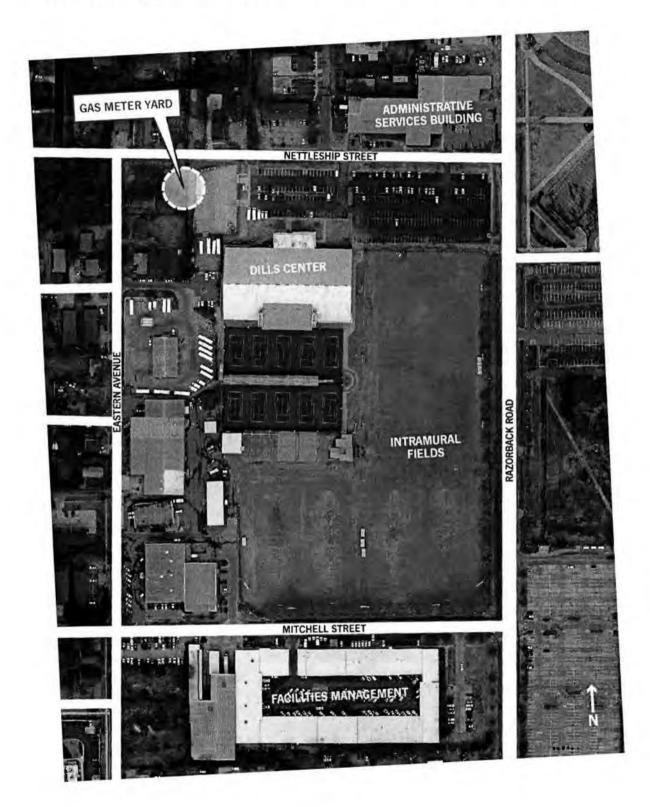

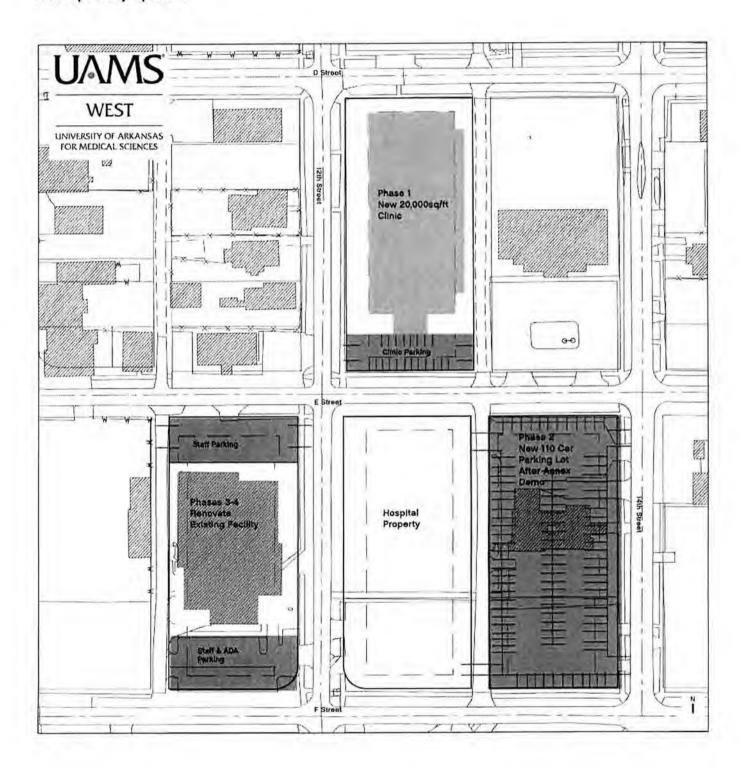

Chancellor G. David Gearhart, University of Arkansas, Fayetteville, requests approval to execute a subcontract agreement with Ozark Integrated Circuits, Inc., located in Fayetteville.

The University of Arkansas received a \$200,000 National Science Foundation Accelerating Innovation Research (NSF AIR) project titled "Application Specific Data Acquisition Using High Temperature Applications Silicon Carbide CMOS." This up to two-year project will focus on the creation and demonstration of SiC DAQ system, which involve the evaluation of core SiC data conversion functions to understand operation over temperature and process variations. Dr. H. Alan Mantooth is the principal investigator and Dr. Jia Di is the co-investigator.

The NSF AIR program requires a small business concern to participate in this research. Ozark Integrated Circuits, Inc. (Ozark IC) of Fayetteville collaborated on the proposal submitted to the NSF and is integral to the research effort. As Dr. Mantooth has a 10 percent and Dr. Di has a 5 percent equity stake in Ozark IC, we are requesting approval to allow the University of Arkansas to issue a subcontract to Ozark IC. Per NSF requirements, the Program Officer has received a copy of the Conflict of Interest Management Plans for both investigators and has approved the project for funding.

Because Dr. Mantooth and Dr. Di have equity interest in Ozark IC, questions of conflict of interest are raised. In addition to the Conflict of Interest Management Plans, Act 875 of 1989, as amended, allows an institution of higher education to contract with a firm in which an employee of the institution has a financial interest if the contract involves intellectual property rights in which both the institution and the employee have interests, provided the contract is approved by the Board of Trustees in a public meeting.

On the basis of the above considerations, Chancellor Gearhart recommends approval of the contract and I concur with this recommendation. A proposed resolution approving the contract is attached for your consideration.

### c. New courses and course descriptions:

READ 7393 is a special topics course used primarily to meet new state initiatives. It will be tailored to serve as an introductory course about dyslexia. READ 7353 has not been offered in several years, nor is it a required or elective course for any current degree program or certificate. The course description will be revised to better align with the content needed for the dyslexia law guidelines. READ 7385 and READ 7387 represent two new practicum courses that will provide teachers with supervised experience working with students experiencing moderate to severe difficulties with reading, including dyslexia.

### READ 7393 Special Topics in Reading Education: Teaching Children with Dyslexia

Course Description: Prerequisite: Graduate Standing, Consent of the Instructor. This course is designed to provide practicing teachers and other educational professionals with an introduction to dyslexia, the myths and politics associated with the history of dyslexia, an overview of Arkansas law relating to assessment and intervention of children with dyslexia, an overview of special education law specific to dyslexia, dyslexia characteristics associated with development of the structure of language, and a review of literacy development as it relates to children with moderate and severe difficulties with learning to read from emergent to advanced stages of development. [Existing Special Topics course]

### READ 7353 Diagnosis of Reading Difficulties II

Course Description: Prerequisite: READ 7352 or admission to the Dyslexia certificate program. This course is designed to extend candidates' ability to assess and evaluate students with moderate to severe reading difficulties, including dyslexia. Additional content will focus on review of diagnostic procedures, review of referral and intervention processes, and a multi-disciplinary team approach. [Existing Course]

### READ 7385 Formative Assessment and Interventions for Children with Dyslexia

Course Description: Prerequisite: READ 7353. The course focuses on the principles of intervention for diagnosing literacy problems for students from the emergent stages of reading through the advanced stages of reading to learn. Special attention is given to the use of formative assessment and delivering small group interventions targeted toward students experiencing moderate to severe difficulties with literacy development, including dyslexia. [New Course]

#### READ 7387 Advanced Practicum for Dyslexia Therapists

Course Description: Prerequisite: READ 7353. This course is the capstone experience for candidates working toward certification as a Dyslexia Therapist in Arkansas. Candidates will implement a research-based intervention model in a school setting, collect data on the effectiveness of the intervention model and strategies used, and write an intervention report. [New Course]

### d. Documentation that program meets employer needs:

Pursuant to Act 1294, no later than the 2015-16 academic year, school districts will be required to have at least one individual to serve as a dyslexia interventionist (Arkansas Department of Education, 2014). There are 239 public school districts representing 1120 schools serving 483,983 students being taught by roughly 34,000 teachers in Arkansas as well as 44 charter schools. In addition, there are 174 private schools serving 28,583 students being taught by 3,150 teachers. Thus, projected initial demand for graduates, statewide, is roughly 1,200 teachers (Arkansas Department of Education).

Licensure to be certified as a dyslexia therapist is an add-on certificate. Thus, all teachers in Arkansas would be eligible to complete this certificate. Considering that there 1120 public schools in Arkansas and that many schools will need 2-3 interventionists to meet the weekly supplemental instructional demands of children who are identified with dyslexia, the likelihood is that over 3,000 teachers will seek this certification over the next 3-4 years. Furthermore, there is the potential for another 200 teachers in private schools to seek this certification.

The Arkansas State Department estimates that after the RtI process for identification of dyslexia has been completed that roughly 5% of the student population (24,000 students state-wide) is likely to be identified. Take into consideration the number of students who will receive Tier II supplemental instruction prior to their final diagnosis and it is clear that many schools across Arkansas will need 2-3 full-time dyslexia interventionists to meet the mandates of the new law.

In addition to regular classroom teachers seeking this certification, we anticipate that many school districts in Arkansas that employ intervention teachers and teacher leaders as well as special education teachers and literacy coaches, will support their teachers to complete this certification to expand their interventionist services. With the UALR Center for Literacy's network of roughly 1,000 teachers across 5 states, there is great potential for significant enrollments.

### e. Student demand (projected enrollment) for program:

With current faculty and assuming that the first two courses are taught Fall 2015, this 12-hour online graduate certificate program has the potential to produce roughly 90-100 program completers by the end of Spring 2018. Taking into account regular classroom teachers and special education teachers, who are likely to invest in a 4-course certification program, as well as the network of intervention teachers and literacy coaches associated with the UALR Center for Literacy, we estimate 3,500-4,500 or about 10% teachers statewide that will be interested in this certification. Given that we will be offering this program online and that current proposed course rotation is estimated at producing 60-75 students annually, roughly 475 students have the potential to matriculate through this program from 2015-2022.

From the ranks of UALR, the Department of Teacher Education produces roughly 65-75 teachers at the elementary, middle school, and secondary levels annually. We estimate that 5-10% of these licensed graduates will also be interested in this certification.

Outside of Arkansas and with the recent change in policy to waive out-of-state tuition for new graduate students located in states contiguous to Arkansas, we expect that a significant number of intervention teachers and teacher leaders will be interested in this certificate, especially from Missouri.

### f. Name of institutions offering similar program and the institutions used as a model to develop the proposed program:

As of February 2015, there are less than a dozen qualified dyslexia therapists in the State, and none are employed in Arkansas schools to our knowledge. Based on the February ADE Licensure Newsletter, nine public institutions of higher education have submitted LOIs to

create similar programs. With 22 states having enacted dyslexia laws, there is speculation that this certification trend will continue to grow for the next decade. In fact, given that early

According to the U.S. Bureau of Labor Statistics, Office of Occupational Statistics and Employment Projections, the demand for Human Resource Managers is expected to grow by 13 percent nationally and 16 percent in Arkansas between 2012 and 2022. Training and development management positions are expected to grow 11 percent nationally and 12 percent in Arkansas during that same time period. Human resource specialists are projected to grow 8 percent nationally and 7 percent in Arkansas. This GC would prepare graduates for employment in each of these areas of HR.

Some students prefer to begin their graduate education in a certificate program while they determine if a graduate program is right for them or while they prepare for master degree program entry exams. This certificate would allow students to take graduate courses that could be used for credit toward a master degree in business administration or a master in industrial-organizational psychology. According to the Bureau of Labor of Statistics, industrial-organizational psychology is the fastest growing profession with a projected growth of 53 percent nationwide between 2012 and 2011. Statistics for Arkansas are not available.

### e. Student demand (projected enrollment) for program

A survey was conducted of human resource management professionals in Arkansas to gauge interest in the proposed GC. Fifty-eight individuals responded to the survey. Of those, 52 percent indicated that the program would be very valuable to the human resource professionals in Arkansas. An additional 45 percent indicated it would be somewhat valuable. Fifty-eight percent said that they would be likely or very likely to enroll in the program. Respondents indicated an interest in both on-campus and online courses with 48 percent preferring online only and 48 percent preferring a combination of on-campus and online courses.

### f. Name of institutions offering similar program and the institutions used as a model to develop the proposed program

We did not find any schools offering joint HR/OP graduate certificates. Graduate certificates in both human resource management and in industrial-organizational psychology are fairly common across the U.S., but we found no instance of a combined graduate certificate.

Appalachian State University offers a Master of Arts degree in Industrial Organizational Psychology and Human Resource Management and this program was used loosely as a reference for the proposed GC.

Chancellor Daniel W. Rahn, University of Arkansas for Medical Sciences, has requested approval of a proposal to create a Graduate Certificate in Health Sciences Innovation and Entrepreneurship to be offered through the UAMS Graduate School. This two-year program will be offered to Ph.D. and postdoctoral fellows as part of a training initiative through the NIH funded Translational Research Institute at UAMS, effective fall 2015. #### 5. REASON FOR PROPOSED PROGRAM IMPLEMENTATION:

The Health Sciences Innovation and Entrepreneurship (HSIE) graduate certificate program represents the new NRSA Training Core of the NIH (CTSA) –funded Translational Research Institute at UAMS. As such, we have applied for five years of NIH funding as a component of the CTSA grant renewal to provide stipend, tuition and fees for trainees. The HSIE graduate certificate program is scheduled to accept students in August, 2015. Each trainee will participate in the program for two years. The training program will represent the first cross-campus training opportunity for PhD students and postdoctoral fellows in health science innovation and entrepreneurship, and to our knowledge, will be the fourth program of its kind in the nation.

Once fully implemented in Year 2, the program will include 4 PhD students and 6 postdoctoral fellows for two years of training. A recent survey of the UAMS campus indicated that 75% of PhD students and postdoctoral fellows in the Colleges of Medicine, Nursing, Pharmacy and Public Health would be interested in participating in this program, primarily as a mechanism to enhance their readiness and competitiveness for industry, government and other nonacademic jobs.

### 6. PROVIDE THE FOLLOWING:

a. Curriculum outline - List of required courses - Total semester credit hours required

The Graduate Certificate in Health Sciences Innovation and Entrepreneurship will include 15 semester credit hours taken over a 2-year period, and will rely on the following five components:

- Graduate business courses offered by the Entrepreneurship Program in the Sam Walton College of Business at the University of Arkansas campus in Fayetteville (two 3-credit courses = 6 credits; Year 1). As detailed below in section 9b), trainees will be required to take the first two of three available entrepreneurship courses, which will be evening courses offered sequentially by interactive videoconferencing starting in fall of Year 1 of the HSIE Training Program.
- 2) Elective graduate course (3-credit course; semester 1 of Year 2). Trainees may choose a third entrepreneurship course offered by the Sam M. Walton College of Business at UA-Fayetteville, or alternatively, choose one of four courses offered on-line by the Regulatory Sciences Certificate Program in the UAMS College of Public Health.
- 3) "Health Science Entrepreneurs: Innovators of Health Care" Seminar Series (2 credits; Years 1-2). This seminar series held between September and June will host 12 featured speakers, and be co-sponsored by the HSIE Training Program, the UAMS Translational Research Institute and UAMS BioVentures. It will feature local and nationally recognized health sciences entrepreneurs. Trainees will participate in the Seminar Series in Years 1 and 2 of the program for a total of 24 sessions that include small group interactions with each speaker.
- 4) Snapshot Sessions (<u>1 credit</u>; Years 1-2). HSIE trainees will choose from a smorgasbord of meetings, internship opportunities and new learning experiences tailored to open his/her eyes to new aspects of innovation and entrepreneurship. These experiences will be approved by an Advisory Committee and arranged by the Program Director.
- 5) Capstone Project in Team Business Innovation (3 credits; semester 2 of Year 2). HSIE Scholar Teams composed of the five HSIE Scholars (two PhD students, three postdoctoral fellows) that entered the HSIE Training Program in the same year will identify a research topic with potential commercialization value and write a business plan with guidance from three members of the HSIE Training Program faculty. We have 45 faculty on our roster.
- Course descriptions (If existing courses were modified to create new courses, list existing courses/course topics utilized to develop proposed certificate)

The following three existing courses will be offered by interactive distance learning by the Sam M. Walton College of Business at UA-Fayetteville (see attached letters from Dr. Carol Reeves, Associate Vice-Provost for Entrepreneurship at UA-Fayetteville and Eli Jones, Dean of the Sam M. Walton College of Business):

MGMT 5213 Foundations of Business for Entrepreneurs (3 semester credits). DESCRIPTION: The course covers the fundamental concepts needed to evaluate and launch a successful new venture. The course is appropriate for non-business students who ultimately hope to start companies. Students will obtain a basic knowledge of how to start, finance, expand, and manage a company. Learning objectives include an understanding of the importance of protecting intellectual property, legal issues affecting small business, how to conduct market research, elements of effective business communication, managing people and teams, basic elements of negotiation, analysis of a firm's strengths and weaknesses, importance of sustainable competitive advantage, the role of financial statements, and financial statement analysis.

MGMT 5323 New Venture Development (3 semester credits). DESCRIPTION: The course focuses on the identification and analysis of new venture opportunities and how entrepreneurs acquire the human and financial resources needed to develop successful businesses. Topics include market analysis, development of products and services, negotiation, developing and executing business plans, and new venture financing.

MBAD 5413 Partnering Project (3 semester credits). DESCRIPTION: A large-scale, real world project involving hands-on work addressing issues faced by mangers in partnering firms. Students will develop a plan and make a presentation that is investment-worthy, speak with investors and understand investments from their perspective, and gain a better understanding of the financial considerations for starting, building, and exiting a new venture.

Trainees will have the option of taking *one* of the following three existing on-line courses in the Regulatory Sciences Certificate Program at UAMS, instead of MBAD 5413 offered by the Sam M. Walton College of Business at UA-Fayetteville.

OEHM 6023 Risk Assessment and Regulatory Science (3 semester credits). DESCRIPTION: Risk analysis plays an important role in Public Health decision making. Policies of the U.S., European Union, China, Japan and other trading partners ensure that risk analysis will have ever-increasing importance. This course provides an educational opportunity targeting current risk analysis methods and emphasizing application to drugs and foods. The common link is how risk analysis is done, how it is interpreted, and how it influences regulatory decision-making. Students will learn how to: 1) apply the science behind risk-based decision making, 2) examine complex problems involving regulated products, 3) utilize emerging analytic approaches and 4) critically review important issues.

OEHM 6033 Design and Management of Clinical Trials (3 semester credits). DESCRIPTION: This course examines the design and conduct of clinical trials from the perspectives of the investigator, the sponsor, and the regulators. Students gain an understand critical elements in study design and the process for designing a clinical trial, relevant regulations and guidelines pertaining to clinical trials, issues in data collection, verification, management, and analysis, and issues affecting the worldwide clinical trials environment.

PHSC 6043 Good Regulatory Practices (3 semester credits). DESCRIPTION: This course reviews the U.S. Food and Drug Administration (FDA) and International Conference on Harmonization (ICH) regulations on pharmaceutical good manufacturing, good laboratory, and good clinical practices. Specifically, the course will address regulations that insure data quality systems designed to insure uniformity, consistency, reliability, reproducibility, quality and integrity of data intended to support regulatory decisions, especially as they relate to drug development, regulatory approval, manufacturing and distribution. The meaning of these regulations, the globalization of practices, and the roles and responsibilities of various professionals implementing these regulations will be addressed. The course will be divided into three modules, addressing Good Laboratory Practices, Good Clinical Practices, and Good Manufacturing Practices. Special emphasis will be on detailed coverage of the process for the assembly and submission of an IND or NDA and the function of the regulatory affairs department in a pharmaceutical company.

The final 6 semester credits required for the 15-credit graduate certificate in Health Sciences Innovation and Entrepreneurship represent seminar series participation, independent study and a team learning project on the UAMS campus. These activities are not based on existing courses, and will be tailored to the Individual Development Plans (IDPs) of the trainees,

which will be an integral part of training planning as recommended by the NIH. However, plans for these courses have been reviewed by the UAMS Translational Research Institute's Leadership Council and several members of the HSIE Executive Committee. Details are provided below for these courses:

Seminar Series: Health Science Entrepreneurs: Innovators of Health Care (2 semester credits). DESCRIPTION: This seminar series will be directed by S. Michael Owens. Professor of Pharmacology and Toxicology and founding partner of InterVexion Therapeutics in Little Rock. It will host 12 featured speakers annually, and be co-sponsored by the HSIE Training Program, the UAMS Translational Research Institute and UAMS BioVentures. It will feature local and nationally recognized health sciences entrepreneurs. Trainees will participate in the Seminar Series in Years 1 and 2 of the program for a total of 24 sessions that include small group interactions with each speaker. There will be four components: 1) Innovators in Translational and Clinical Science. During each semester, three nationally recognized innovators in translation or clinical science with histories of entrepreneurship and commercialization will be invited to present a seminar on campus. HSIE trainees will be required to attend and meet with the visitor as a group. Each speaker will be asked to address specific questions, including: key discoveries, decision points for going forward with R&D, paths to commercialization, and major hurdles to commercial success. 2) Profiles of UAMS BioVentures Start-up Companies. These seminars will highlight the accomplishments of on-site UAMS health science innovators. Trainees will have the opportunity to meet with the speakers to learn about successful start-up programs or companies on the UAMS campus. 3) Role Models for Team Science. These seminars will focus on successes of preeminent scientific teams on the UAMS campus. The goal will be to gain a deeper understanding of how scientific teams are founded, develop and mature into productive and interactive teams to promote synergistic discovery. 4) Understanding and Overcoming Potential Hurdles to Success. During this component of the seminar series, trainees will learn a variety of issues specific to innovative and entrepreneurial activities. Anticipated topics may include: disclosures, intellectual property (IP), patents, small business grants (e.g., SBIR/STTR), venture capital funding, ethics in research and discovery, and managing conflicts of interest and commitment. The speakers will be recruited from UAMS campus innovators, business and legal counsel from UAMS and other UA network institutions, and private companies. We plan to include speakers with expertise in bioethics, diversity and team science, who will advocate these principles as necessary assets for longterm entrepreneurial success.

Independent Study: Snapshot Sessions (1 semester credit). DESCRIPTION: These sessions are the independent study component of the HSIE Training Program, and will consist of 12 to 14 of individualized learning experiences during the 2-year duration of the HSIE Training Program. The sessions are intended to open the trainee's eyes to new areas of health science innovation and entrepreneurship, with learning events individualized to the career goals of the trainee. The Trainee will write a short report for his/her Advisory Committee after each Snapshot Session. The activities may include regional (i.e., the annual Arkansas Commercialization Retreat) or national meetings or symposia, internships or externships with health science entrepreneurs, legal counsel, or government agencies. On-site sessions may include attending a BioVentures Intellectual Property meeting, Internal Review Board meeting, Conflict of Interest committee meeting, or other institutional meetings that directly impact health science innovation and translation.

Capstone Project in Team Business Innovation (3 semester credits). DESCRIPTION: Teams composed of the five HSIE trainees (two PhD students, three postdoctoral fellows) that entered the HSIE Training Program in the same year will identify a research topic with

potential commercialization value and write a business plan with guidance from three members of the HSIE Training Program faculty. The team will identify needed data and write a short business development plan – including necessary financial and other resources – to commercialize their proposed product. Patents and rights protection of IP will be leveraged as part of the business plan development, which also will include market analysis using a SWOT (Strengths-Weaknesses-Opportunities-Threats) study.

## c. Program goals and objectives

The HSIE Training Program proposes to supplement the traditional biomedical sciences training of PhD graduate students and postdoctoral fellows to broaden their vision of how biomedical discoveries can be translated into improved health care through the commercialization of intellectual property. Trainees will earn the certificate while continuing department-based research under the guidance of their primary mentor. Thus, it is designed to be a "value added" program composed primarily of evening courses (UA-Fayetteville, Sam M. Walton College of Business), on-line courses (UAMS Regulatory Sciences option), or flexible courses (Independent Study and Capstone Project at UAMS). When fully established in Year 2 of the program, 6 postdoctoral fellows and 4 PhD graduate students will participate in the curriculum. Trainees will be recruited from the four UAMS Colleges of Medicine, Nursing, Pharmacy and Public Health as an inter-professional training program. Trainees will be introduced to the principles of entrepreneurship and introduced to the culture and mind-set of the successful entrepreneur as a means to advance health sciences discoveries. UAMS will partner with the Sam M. Walton College of Business at the University of Arkansas campus in Fayetteville (UA-Fayetteville) to offer value-added instruction to the traditional biomedical sciences tracks at UAMS. The supplemental training will culminate in a Graduate Certificate in Health Sciences Innovation and Entrepreneurship. The program will directly complement the workforce training mission of the UAMS Translational Research Institute (TRI) and heighten awareness of entrepreneurial opportunities on our campus. The main objectives of the HSIE Training Program are to:

- Develop a 2-year training program for PhD graduate students and postdoctoral fellows, which will highlight business principles, entrepreneurial skills and opportunities to innovate health care.
- Use individual development plans to tailor training in Health Sciences Innovation and Entrepreneurship to meet the short- and long- term career objectives of each participating trainee.
- 3) Provide health science trainees with the opportunity to earn a Graduate Certificate in Health Sciences Innovation and Entrepreneurship to enhance their readiness and competitiveness for industry, government and other nonacademic jobs, while maintaining excellence in biomedical research provided by their department-based programs.
- 4) Partner with the TRI and UAMS BioVentures, our technology transfer and business incubation office, to increase entrepreneurial activity within the CTSA Hub by heightening awareness of steps required to translate new technologies and concepts through commercialization into improved health care.

### TO THE MEMBERS OF THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES

#### Dear Trustees:

Based upon technology developed by researchers at the University of Arkansas for Medical Sciences (UAMS), the University has applied for patents on a collection of natural products known as tocopherols and tocoflexols which are useful for protection against radiation-induced damage. Subject to Board approval, the University is licensing the patent rights to an Arkansas-based start-up company, Tocol Pharmaceuticals, LLC ("Tocol"), for the purpose of commercializing the technology.

In consideration for granting an exclusive license to Tocol, the University will receive royalties at the rate of five percent (5%) of net sales and thirty percent (30%) of any sublicensing income. The License Agreement further establishes certain developmental milestones that must be met by Tocol to maintain the exclusive license. The Agreement contains liability, confidentiality, and insurance provisions which the General Counsel believes are protective of the University.

Tocol is incorporated in the state of Arkansas and is currently receiving certain advisory services from UAMS BioVentures. Dr. Cesar Compadre, a professor in the UAMS College of Pharmacy, and Dr. Philip Breen, an associate professor also in the College of Pharmacy, currently hold equity interests in Tocol.

Because Drs. Compadre and Breen have a direct financial interest in Tocol and are employees of UAMS, questions of conflict of interest are raised. However, Act 875 of 1989, as amended, allows an institution of higher education to contract with a firm in which an employee of the institution has a financial interest if the contract involves intellectual property rights in which both the institution and the employee have interests. Under the law, the contract must, however, be approved by the Board of Trustees in a public meeting.

On the basis of the above considerations, Chancellor Rahn recommends approval of the license to Tocol. Because of the potential for developing local Arkansas business and employment and the importance of promoting advances in medical care, I concur with his recommendation. A proposed resolution approving the license agreement is attached.

### Dear Trustees:

Based upon technology developed by researchers at the University of Arkansas for Medical Sciences (UAMS), the University has applied for patents on approaches for the prevention, treatment, modulation or palliation of diseases or conditions through the clearance or killing of senescent cells. Subject to Board approval, the University is licensing the patent rights to a California-based start-up company, Unity Biotechnology, Inc. ("Unity"), for the purpose of commercializing the technology and intellectual property.

In consideration for granting an exclusive license to Unity, the University will receive royalties at the rate of 0.82% percent of net sales with minimum annual royalties of \$12,000 per year. The License Agreement further establishes certain developmental milestones that must be met by Unity to maintain the exclusive license. These milestones have the possibility of generating payments, in the aggregate, of up to \$733,330. The Agreement contains liability, confidentiality, and insurance provisions which the General Counsel believes are protective of the University.

UAMS is concurrently entering into a Sponsored Research Agreement with Unity under which Dr. Daohong Zhou, a professor in the College of Pharmacy, will be the principal investigator. Dr. Zhou is a co-inventor of the technology being licensed to Unity and holds an equity interest in the company.

Because Dr. Zhou has a direct financial interest in Unity and is an employee of UAMS and the principal investigator in a Unity-funded Sponsored Research Agreement, questions of conflict of interest are raised. However, Act 875 of 1989, as amended, allows an institution of higher education to contract with a firm in which an employee of the institution has a financial interest if the contract involves intellectual property rights in which both the institution and the employee have interests. Under the law, the contract must, however, be approved by the Board of Trustees in a public meeting.

On the basis of the above considerations, Chancellor Rahn recommends approval of both the license to Unity and the Sponsored Research Agreement with the company. Because of the importance of promoting advances in medical care and the ability for UAMS to receive significant research revenue to support this important work, I concur with his recommendation. A resolution approving the License Agreement and the Sponsored Research Agreement is attached.

## c. Documentation that program options meet employer needs:

The proposed concentrations were developed in direct response to needs expressed by employers in the region for graduates with specific skill sets in these particular areas. Representatives from Wal-Mart, Baldor/ABB, Arkansas Best Freight (ABF), and Propak approached UAFS to schedule meetings with Computer and Information Science department faculty and administrators to discuss their needs. Subsequent meetings were held to develop the curriculum, resulting in the three proposed concentrations.

During the development of the Enterprise Computing Concentration, representatives from Baldor/ABB and Wal-Mart were pleased to note that students will receive hands-on instruction in the technical components of the SAP software. The SAP Academic Alliance representative, noting a nationwide trend in the use of SAP software, said the approach being taken by UAFS is unique in that most schools teach how to modify and tweak the package as delivered. The UAFS curriculum will address the technical aspects and expose students to new development and integration of systems already in place.

The UAFS CIS department frequently receives requests from area businesses in the region for graduates who know not only how to do the basics but how to make use of the development process of mobile applications to provide a competitive advantage for their organization. The demand for graduates with training in mobile application development is currently outpacing the demand for web site design specialists. ProPak has indicated they must frequently go outside our region to recruit the workforce needed to develop competitive mobile applications. As tablets and smart phones continue to evolve, the demand is projected to grow to keep pace.

The MIS concentration is in demand by companies needing graduates with an understanding of technology and its relationship to gaining a competitive edge in the market place for their businesses. Based on past requests for this type of educational training, UAFS anticipates this concentration will grow rapidly. A student who understands both technology and business will provide future employers a single source of understanding in both of these areas.

## d. Student demand (projected enrollment) for program option:

Based on meetings with Wal-Mart, Baldor/ABB, ABF, and Propak, as well as requests from other businesses in the UAFS service area, regarding their need for graduates with these skill sets, UAFS anticipates student demand for these concentrations will be high.

# e. Name of institutions offering similar concentrations and the institution(s) used as a model to develop the proposed program options:

UAFS could not identify any colleges or universities in Arkansas that offer a degree in Information Technology with 30-hour concentrations in Enterprise Computing, Management Information Systems, or Mobile Application Development. Some universities offer courses in these areas and UA Fayetteville offers graduate courses in SAP; however, none offer a 30-hour concentration. The MIS option is offered by different colleges and universities in Arkansas, but not in the format where the course work is a concentration contained within an IT bachelor's degree.

The SAP Academic Alliance software is needed to offer the concentration in Enterprise Computing. This software, at a cost of \$8,000.00 per year, has been purchased for 2015. A local company has offered to pay this expense for the next three years to assist with implementation of this concentration. Local industry professionals who meet the requirements as adjunct faculty at UAFS will be utilized to teach some of the required courses along with the UAFS CIS faculty. Training provided by the SAP Academic Alliance, offered at no additional cost to UAFS, will assist faculty with remaining current with the software.

The MIS Concentration will require no additional cost as this concentration requires only a realignment of existing courses into a sequence and focus area. No additional software or hardware will be needed.

No additional expenses will be incurred to offer the Mobile Application Development concentration since UAFS currently has a license from Apple to utilize their development software, the Android development software is free and open source, and the Windows Development software is purchased on a regular basis through the Computer and Information Science departments' Microsoft Academic Alliance license.

## c. Documentation that program option meets employer needs

A broad survey of employers—both local and national—was conducted, including art museums, galleries, arts centers, cultural organizations supporting art education, and art publishing.

Several of the institutions, namely Crystal Bridges Museum of American Art and the Arkansas Center for the Arts, vigorously stressed the need in Arkansas for well-trained graduates with an art history background.

Of the 11 organizations/departments surveyed, all believed that B.A. graduates with a background in art history could find employment with their institution. Job openings vary depending on the focus of the respective institution; turn-over rates ranged from every 1-2 years to 3-4 years. (It is typical in art settings for people to stay in a position for 3-5 years.) Starting salaries were similarly mixed. Some small institutions (e.g., the Fort Smith Regional Art Museum and KC Auction Company) primarily use contractual workers paid at \$10-\$15 an hour. Museums and arts centers are more likely to support established positions, with starting yearly salaries ranging from \$27,000 to \$35,000. In one case (Arts Partners), benefits are not offered and, thus, the starting salary was higher: \$35,000-\$55,000.

First and foremost, the employers interviewed desire job candidates who have received a rigorous, broad training in the history of art. Well-developed skills in research and writing are critical to successful employment in this field. Above all, employers expressed a desire for creative, critical thinking—all of which will be hallmarks of the minor in Art History at UAFS.

In addition, of the skill sets listed on the Employer Needs Survey Form, the following were most often deemed as "absolutely necessary": interpersonal communications; written/oral communications; teamwork; independent worker; analytical reasoning; planning/organizing; problem solver; and an ability to work with computer applications—all skills emphasized in Art History courses at UAFS.

## d. Student demand (projected enrollment) for program option

In all 23 classes surveyed, students positively responded to the possibility of minoring in Art History.

All students currently enrolled in Studio Art, Graphic Design, and Art History classes (comprising both art/graphic design majors and non-majors) were surveyed as to their possible interest in an Art History Minor. The results were extremely positive: of the 207 students surveyed, 165 expressed interest in an Art History minor, while 42 expressed no interest in an Art History minor.

Positive results were also found with selected surveys done outside Art/Graphic Design classes. Two classes of Humanities through the Arts (HUMN 2563) were surveyed: of the 54 students surveyed, 36 expressed interest in an Art History minor, while 18 expressed no interest in an Art History minor. First-year students in a class of English Composition I (ENGL 1203) and upper-level students in Rhetorical and Textual Criticism (RHET 3303) were similarly surveyed: of the 39 students queried, 22 students expressed interest in an Art History minor, while 17 expressed no interest.

# c. Documentation that program option meets employer needs

Walmart, Arkansas Best Freight (ABF), and Baldor/ABB have contacted UAFS to request additional statistics course offerings for their current and future employees. A statistics minor is the first step in helping these companies build a team to work on "big data" projects. Specifically, Walmart is looking for employees who are business majors with a statistics minor; ABF and Baldor/ABB need IT majors with a strong statistics background. A statistics minor will help our students become more marketable and stronger candidates for their future positions in a competitive, global market.

# d. Student demand (projected enrollment) for program option

The UAFS math department conducted a survey of STAT 2503 classes in the fall 2013 semester. Five total classes were surveyed, and the total number of students completing the survey was 123. Of those 123 students, 18 percent responded with either "extremely interested" or "very interested". There are approximately 325 students who take STAT 2503 each semester. This indicates that we could expect to have up to 58 students pursue a minor in statistics were it offered at UAFS.

#### 5. REASON FOR PROPOSED ACTION:

A minor in Teaching English as a Second Language will expand on the existing Certificate of Proficiency that was first offered spring 2012. The TESL Certificate was originally intended for foreign exchange students coming to UAFS; however, it has also attracted students who are returning to college to further their education, as well as to students interested in teaching ESL in local or international institutes.

The minor in TESL fills a gap existing in our curriculum. It will be available to current UAFS students majoring in any field, and will give students the basic skills required to teach ESL in the non-public sectors world-wide. It will also enable them to more readily access higher education programs in TESL in the United States.

Students obtaining the minor in TESL will also receive the Teaching English as a Second Language (TESL) Certificate of Proficiency. The CP in TESL includes only 15 credit hours of coursework. We are thus expanding this Certificate in order to give UAFS students another option for a minor, which will be much more useful to them in terms of transferability to other universities.

### d. Documentation that program option meets employer needs:

- According to the National Center for Education Statistics, "In school year, 27 percent
  of all schools with bilingual/ESL teaching vacancies found them very difficult or
  impossible to fill, more than for many other teaching fields." Since this report, the
  number of ESL job vacancies has grown rapidly.
- From the same report: "As the number of children with difficulty speaking English has
  increased (from 1.25 million in 1979 to 2.44 million in 1995), so has the burden on
  school systems to recruit teachers with the skills necessary to teach these classes. The
  difficulty schools have in filling such positions is one indication of whether the supply
  of bilingual and ESL teachers is adequate to meet the demand."
- The number of Limited English Proficiency speakers grew 104.7%, from 2,154,781 in 1989 to 4,416,580 in 2000 according to a survey performed by the National Clearinghouse for English Language Acquisition.

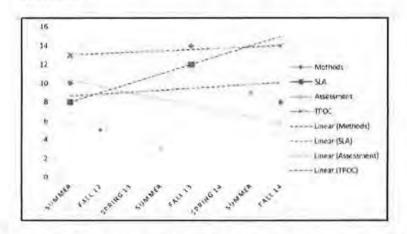
The U.S. Department of Education Office of Postsecondary Education has identified English as a second language as a "teacher shortage area" in Arkansas for three of the last four years.

### e. Student demand (projected enrollment) for program option:

The TESL minor will expand on the existing TESL Certificate of Proficiency that was first offered spring 2012. The TESL Certificate was originally intended for foreign exchange students coming to UAFS; however, it has also attracted students who are returning to college to further their education, as well as to UAFS students interested in teaching ESL in local or international institutes.

The chart below indicates trends in registration in the TESL classes since summer 2012. Three of the classes (Methods, Second Language Acquisition, and Teaching People of Other Cultures) have exhibited a rising trend since summer 2012, when all four courses began to be offered for the TESL Certificate. Assessment exhibits a falling trend. However, this course has been taught three summers in a row, whereas the TPOC and SLA courses have only been taught twice during the same period of time. Only the Methods course has been offered more frequently – four times, due to the fact that it is a required course for the BS in Spanish.

A steeper rise in registration trends is predicted if TESL becomes a minor due to the interest shown in it by students – both those who are currently completing a degree at UAFS, and those who have already completed a degree and are returning to further their education.

The Bachelor of Science in Criminal Justice is designed to give students and law enforcement practitioners an overview of the discipline during the first two years of study, and an opportunity to select from a variety of criminal justice course offerings and related interdisciplinary courses during the final two years. This combination exposes students to a broad range of topics, allowing them to select a specific sub-discipline or concentration in their final two years. The curricula and coursework offered in the program has been specifically developed in cooperation with major police agencies in the region and reflects a hands-on practical approach to criminal justice studies, while maintaining a rigorous academic experience. This balance equips students to function in a variety of criminal justice positions or as post-baccalaureate students in criminal justice, criminology, criminal behavior, police management, law, public policy, or social work.

UAFS criminal justice courses are available both on-site and online for students pursuing the degree. Additionally, UAFS has been approached by several institutions in the state to offer the upper-level courses leading to a B.S. in Criminal Justice to criminal justice students on their campuses. Collaboration between institutions has created a program of study that satisfies the curriculum requirements of partnering institutions. Students pursuing the B.S. in Criminal

On many campuses the disciplines in the proposed new college are often found within the same college, as was the case on the UAFS campus several years ago. The recent vacancy of a dean's position in one of the affected colleges makes this an opportune time to merge the colleges. Combining the colleges will not only provide the impetus for added collaboration among departments, but will save the university the salary and benefits needed to replace a dean.

### 7. PROVIDE STAFFING AND BUDGET FOR NEW ORGANIZATIONAL UNIT:

Staffing for the new organizational unit, College of Communication, Languages, Arts and Social Sciences will remain primarily constant with the exception of one dean's position. The total savings from this elimination will be approximately \$185,000 annually.

# 8. IF PROPOSED CHANGE RESULTS IN A REALLOCATION OF FUNDS, WHICH DEPARTMENT/PROGRAM WILL RECEIVE THE REALLOCATED FUNDS?

The proposed change, as noted above, will have a savings of \$185,000. UACCH proposes to remove Introduction to Arc Welding and Position Welding and replace those with Basic Welding and General Tool and Safety. These changes will decrease the program credit hour requirement from 15 credits to 10 credits.

Basic Welding provides the same knowledge components as Arc Welding but with less time for practical application in the lab. General Tool and Safety will ensure the graduates possess the basic knowledge, skills and safety practices necessary to work in any technical field. This course is of special importance since students coming into technical fields are younger and therefore less experienced in basic tool use and safety. UACCH feels these changes will increase the graduates' ability to gain skills, work safely and obtain entry level employment in the area of welding quicker.

This course is of special importance since students coming into our technical fields are younger and therefore less experienced in basic tool use and safety. We feel these changes will increase the graduates' ability to gain skills, work safely and quickly obtain entry level employment in the area of welding.

#### Dear Trustees:

Chancellor Chris Thomason, University of Arkansas Community College at Hope, requested that you be notified of a proposal to reconfigure the academic divisions at UACCH. A summary of the proposal is attached.

The changes in departmental growth at UACCH have required some adjustments to how various academic divisions are aligned. Following the retirement of the Dean of Math and Science in May 2013, UACCH took the opportunity to thoroughly review the academic division structure and to make adjustments that reflect current practice and efficiency within the division. UACCH proposes the following changes which impact three divisions:

The Division of Arts, Humanities, and Social Sciences will become the Division of Arts and Humanities. This division has expanded with the addition of the Texarkana campus. It has been their largest division in full time and part time faculty and SSCH's. UACCH believes that removing the Social Science department from the Arts and Humanities division will create a better focus on remaining departments.

The Math and Science Division will become the Math and Social Science Division. These two departments advise and focus on students seeking general education degrees. By removing Science and adding Social Science, there will be balance within the division while focusing on the same student populations.

The Health Professions Division will become the Science and Health Professions Division. Adding Science creates a balance in the overall department workload and fits a common theme among most colleges. Many of the students who are enrolled in science courses are health professions majors. These departments have a strong history of working together and with the same student population.

Criminal Justice was moved from Arts and Humanities to Business, Technology and Education. This Division will not have a name change and is only affected by the realignment of the Criminal Justice.

The proposal has received the necessary campus approvals. Following the Board meeting, a letter of notification will be sent to the Arkansas Department of Higher Education.

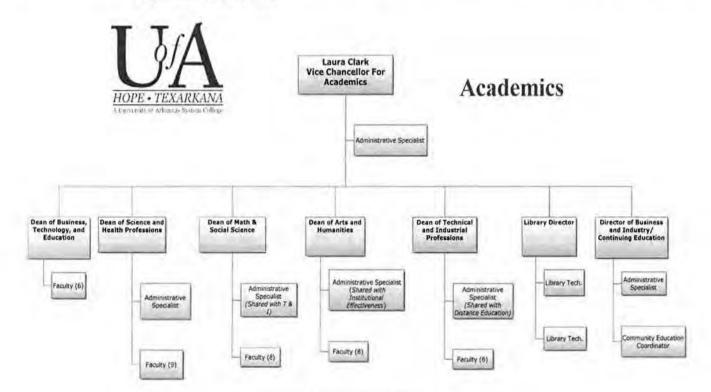

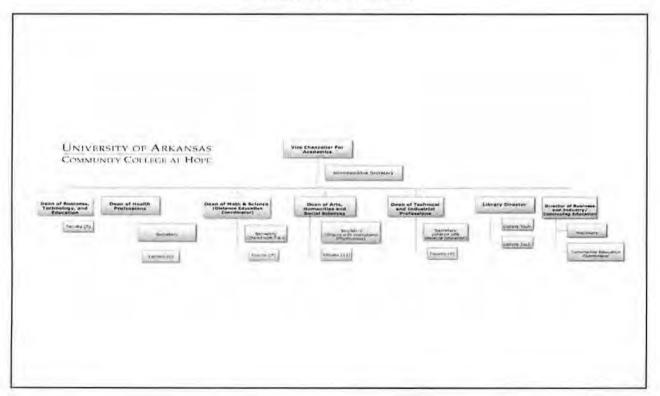

Chancellor Steve Cole, Cossatot Community College of the University of Arkansas, has requested approval of proposals to delete the Associate of Science in General Education and the Associate of Applied Science Medical Assisting degrees. Summaries of the proposals are attached.

Act 747 of 2011 and AHECB Policy 5.22 requires all Associate of Science degrees to be specific in nature and with at least one community college to university articulation agreement in place. Dear Trustees:

Dr. George Sabo, III, Director of the Arkansas Archeological Survey, after consultation with his staff and me, requests that you be briefed concerning the Survey's Blytheville research station.

The previous Archeologist of the Station, the late Claudine Payne, has been succeeded by Michelle Rathgaber, who has been awarded a Walton DDF to pursue doctoral studies this fall in the ENDY program at the University of Arkansas, Fayetteville. Dr. Sabo and Ms. Payne recently met with James W. Sanders, Mayor of the City of Blytheville, and Tucker Nunn, Executive Director of Main Street Blytheville, Inc., to explore prospects of moving the Station to a City-owned building in town. However, available space there will require structural modifications that neither the Survey nor the City can afford. By mutual agreement, Dr. Sabo then explored relocation onto the campus of Arkansas Northeastern College, where free rent space was offered, but on the Burdette campus and only for three years pending the move of Burdette programs to the main campus in 2018. Also, ANC is not interested, at this time, in salary cost-sharing in exchange for a teaching obligation.

In light of the above circumstances, Dr. Ann Early, State Archeologist, Dr. Sabo and his staff concluded that the best option is to terminate the lease at the deteriorating building the Survey currently occupies on the Arkansas Aeroplex, to move the collections and equipment to space available at the Survey's research station on the ASU campus in Jonesboro, and to hire a second research assistant for Dr. Morrow at ASU, whose responsibilities will be dedicated to maintaining the Survey's relationship with the City of Blytheville and continuing the Survey's research programs in Mississippi and Crittenden counties. This does not close the door to future reestablishment of a Blytheville research station or a research station at another location, but it does not obligate the Survey to a commitment that future budget cuts in state funding may jeopardize.

I am bringing this matter to your attention for information only, but if anyone has questions, Dr. Sabo will be available to address them.

### Dear Trustees:

Act 226 of 2013 provides that a person licensed to carry a concealed handgun may do so at a public university, college or community college if such person is a staff member of the public institution unless the governing board of the institution adopts a policy expressly disallowing the carrying of a concealed handgun by staff members in the buildings or on the grounds of the public university, college or community college and posts notices at each entrance to the institution as required by the statute.

Subsequent to the passage of Act 226, the Chancellors and a number of faculty and staff at the University of Arkansas System institutions, including campus public safety officers, expressed the opinion that the Board should adopt a policy expressly disallowing the carrying of a concealed handgun by staff members in the buildings or on the grounds of the University and to post the required notices. At that time and since then, I have discussed Act 226 with the Chancellors and again recommend to the Board adoption of the attached resolution. Act 226 requires that a resolution be adopted each year. I recommend its approval.

Because of recent matters which have come to my attention, I am recommending a change to Board Policy 465.1, Political Activity. I have reviewed this change with members of my cabinet and believe that it is consistent with the provisions and intent of existing policies and law regarding the right of employees to speak publicly on matters of public interest. The existing policy confirms the right of University employees to engage in political activity without involving the institution's name, symbols, property or supplies in such activities. The addition to the policy requires employees speaking publicly on such matters who are identified by name and position with the University to make efforts to make it clear that the employee's comments or opinions are those of the employee and not the University. I believe that it has been the practice of University employees to follow this guidance, but I think it is appropriate to reinforce it by making it a part of the existing policy.

BOARD POLICY 465.1

# POLITICAL ACTIVITY

University employees, as citizens, have the right to engage in political activity. However, no employee may involve the institution's name, symbols, property, or supplies in political activities. If employees speak publicly on matters of public interest and are identified by their name and position with the University, they should make every effort to make it clear that the employee's comments or opinions are those of the employee and not the University.

Any employee who intends to seek public office or to assume a major role in a political campaign is obligated to discuss his/her plans with his/her supervisor. If the supervisor determines that the activity will impinge to any extent upon the full discharge of the employee's responsibilities to the University, the plans must be reviewed through regular administrative channels to the President's office for a determination of work-load and salary adjustment.

Involvements which require part- or full-time services, and for which more than token compensation is received, will require a reduction of work-load and pay, leave-of-absence, or resignation, depending upon the extent of the activity.

WHEREAS, Dr. Stephens helped establish kindergarten programs in the smaller public school districts in Northwest Arkansas in the mid-1970s, and helped create the K-4 program for the Elementary Education Department at the University of Arkansas; and

WHEREAS, Dr. Stephens assisted Bill Mandrell with the expansion of The New School in Fayetteville to include grades 1-3 and was an integral part of the grant writing team that led to the opening of the Jones Center in Springdale; and

WHEREAS, Dr. Stephens was active in the community, serving as a longtime volunteer youth baseball coach in Fayetteville; and

WHEREAS, Dr. Stephens loved teaching, and especially loved his students, and he was proud of the excellent teachers they became;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF THE UNIVERSITY OF ARKANSAS THAT the Board expresses its appreciation for Dr. Stephens' contributions and long service to the University of Arkansas and expresses condolences to his family.

FURTHERMORE, the Board of Trustees directs that this resolution shall be spread upon the minutes of this meeting, and a copy shall be provided to Dr. Stephens' wife, Kay, and to his children, Cheri Frizzell of Fayetteville, Bob Stephens Jr. and wife Pati of Colorado Springs, Mike Stephens and wife Jennifer of Springdale, and Jana Harper and husband Jay of Farmington.
